Heavy Trucks on Highways

The proposal advanced that the Government should bar motor trucks of over one and a balf tons capacity from the roads of the province is not likely to find acceptance at Queen's Park, but it has much more to commend it as a serious proposition than appears at first glance. The collapse of the dreams of Hydro Radial enthusiasts in Ontario was directly connected with national acquisition of railways. The taxpayer who was willing to support radials as a competitor with private corporations drew the line at endorsing a scheme that could only succeed as they took traffic from

other publicly owned lines.

That position was a thoroughly sound one, yet we seem to be doing with our bigh-grade highways what we refused to do with radials. In fact, we have gone further.
