Obituary

ANNA C. LAIDLAW
The funeral of the late Miss Anna C. Laidlaw, A.T.C.M., of Hamilton, only daughter of the late Rev. R. J. Laidlaw, LL.D., took place on Saturday, December 15th, a largely attended service being held at the residence of her aunt, Miss C. McCall, before interment of the remains in the family plot at Greenwood Cemetery.

News of the death, which came after an acute illness, came as a shock to Miss Laidlaw's large circle of friends, many of whom came from a distance to attend her obsequies in token of their affection and esteem for one whose life was marked by the possession of rare talents, a singular brightness of disposition, and devout Christian character. A profusion of floral offerings from far and near bore added testimony to the place which this estimable lady had won in the hearts of those with whom she had been associated.

Early in life Miss Laidlaw had given promise of a brilliant career as a musician, graduating as medalist from both the Hamilton Ladies' College and the Toronto Conservatory of Music. Latterly she was a most prominent member of her profession in Hamilton where, for the past twenty years, she was a teacher on the staff of the Conservatory.

Feeling reference was made to the outstanding nature of Miss Laidlaw's many gifts and graces by Rev. Dr. A. T. Drummond of St. Paul's Methodist Church, Hamilton, who assisted by Rev. Dr. John McCall of Georgetown, uncle of the deceased, conducted the funeral service.

The pall bearers were: Mr. McCullough, President and Dr. Hewlett, Musical Director of the Hamilton Conservatory of Music; Mr. Robt. Morton, Hamilton; and the brothers of the deceased, Dr. Hugh and Dr. Campbell Laidlaw of Ottawa, and Mr. Robertson Laidlaw of St. Andrew's College, Toronto.

It was the golden wedding anniversary of the worthy couple, both of them natives of the west side of Peel, and well known and highly respected residents for many years of Union neighborhood.

The occasion was marked by a gathering of some sixty relatives, all of whom showered upon Mr. and Mrs. Leslie congratulations that they should have come so far together on life's pathway, and good wishes for the future, which they will share.

In honor of the day two little grandchildren, Margaret Leslie and Howard Dolson, presented the celebrants with a bag of gold coins, while the grandchildren gave a beautiful bouquet of flowers appropriately tinted in gold. Stereopticon read an address, in which he expressed his brother and sisters the best wishes that can be uttered by a circle of dutiful children.

Nothing could have been more appropriate than the congratulations which came from the elders and matriarchs of Union Church, with Miss M. and Mrs. Leslie, who were associated for many years, and in which the former has held responsible offices, as well as being connected with the church throughout his entire life. Mr. Leslie was born 78 years ago on the fifth line west Chinguacousy, on the farm on which his father is now located. His father was one of the pioneers, and Mr. Leslie himself recalls many incidents connected with the primitive life of the early settlers.

Mrs. Leslie was born on the 4th line west, Chinguacousy, on the site of the Inter-provincial Brickworks, her father being John Lyons, one of the pioneers of that section. The marriage of 50 years ago was performed at the home of the bride's parents by Rev. Mr. Alexander, who has since passed away. Of the two bridesmaids that day, one is still living, Mrs. Daniel Campbell, sister of the bride, and was a guest at the anniversary celebration. The two grandmothers are also present at the celebration. Dr. John Leslie of Erin and Henry Reid of Georgetown, and joined with Mr. and Mrs. Leslie in many happy reminiscences.

Six children were present on this happy day, Thomas, who came down from Alberta, George and Stewart, Mrs. Will Lyons, Mrs. Albert Dolson and Mrs. Edward Cation, all of them, with the one exception, residing very close to their parents.
