Mayor-Dale, after thanking his  
nominators reviewed the financial  
statement and spoke on town af-  
fairs in general. He referred to  
false rumors regarding the Area  
Co. and stated that the said Com-  
pany was perfectly solvent. He  
was quite willing to step out if  
Mr. McIntyre would accept the  
office of Mayor otherwise he would  
continue in office and give his best  
efforts to the welfare of the town.  
He wished all a Happy New Year.

Reeve-McIntyre gave the rate-  
payers a synopsis of his work in  
1923. He also reviewed the town  
work, good roads and debenture  
debt, and urged the necessity of  
strict economy in conducting the  
business of the municipality dur-  
ing the coming year. He would  
like a candidate for the Reeveship,  
and thanked his nominators and  
order and wished all the comple-  
ments of the season.

Councillor Arnold spoke in a  
fearless manner regarding town  
finances and the financial state-  
ment. He said that the Housing  
Commission affairs in town were  
in a deplorable state. All back  
taxes should be paid or action taken  
to collect same so that ratepayers  
who paid their taxes on time would  
not be penalized. He thanked his  
nominators and thanked the com-  
mittees of the season.

Councillor Near spoke regarding

Councillor Duncan reviewed the  
work in connection with the water  
works. Expressed thanks to his  
nominators and wished all a Happy  
and Prosperous New Year.

Councillor Long spoke regarding  
printing and contingencies, also  
the Soldiers Memorial. He thank-  
ed his nominators and wished all  
the compliments of the season.

Councillor Ashenburt thanked  
the ratepayers who had again  
nominated him, spoke regarding  
Council matters and extended best  
wishes to all for a Happy New  
Year.

Councillor Herrington was ab-  
sent through illness.

**Township Nominations**  
**Reeve, Deputy-Reeve and Coun-  
cillors Elected by Acclamation**

Requesting nominations were  
held in the council chamber at  
Stewarttown on Monday from one  
to two o'clock. There was not as  
large an attendance as usual,  
owing, no doubt, to the fact that  
few ratepayers, if any, had com-  
pliments to register against the ad-  
ministration of the municipality's  
affairs by the Council of 1923.

The fact that not another name  
in addition to those of the present  
members was mentioned for any  
of the offices, is quite unique in the  
history of Essequibo municipal  
politics, and speaks well for those  
who transacted the business of the  
township during the past year.

At the close of nominations  
Clerk J. A. Tracy was appointed  
chairman of the meeting and called  
on the members elect who ad-  
dressed the ratepayers.

Reeve Hampshire, after thank-  
ing his mover and seconder and  
expressing appreciation at the con-  
fidence of the ratepayers in his  
nominations, said that the business  
of the township during the past year  
had been instrumental in  
whole, gave a splendid review of  
the work of the past year. They  
had economized as much as pos-  
sible and endeavored to keep the  
tax rate down to the minimum  
consistent with good government.  
He had been instrumental in  
the assistance of his colleagues in  
securing back taxes on the Upper  
Canada College property at Nor-  
val to the amount of between  
\$2500 and \$3000. As chairman of  
the Finance Committee at County  
Council he had, by the best inter-  
vention, secured a reduction of the  
County \$10,000 by having a  
lump sum bill from the Govern-  
ment for highways itemized. He  
would endeavor to transact the  
business of the township during  
the coming year in the best in-  
terests of all concerned and wished  
all a Happy and Prosperous New  
Year.

Deputy-Reeve Applebe thanked  
his mover and seconder after  
which he referred to his work at  
County Council—He stated that  
County Council a "paying institu-  
tion," as after the fixed sums were  
not for good roads, schools,  
widows pensions, House of Refuge  
and Children's Shelter there was  
very little left of the revenue to  
do anything else. He stated that  
he suggested some change in the  
rate system in order to get better  
results for the money expended,  
and believed, where at all possible,  
township work should be given to  
residents of the municipality. He  
would do his duty in the best in-  
terests of all the compliments of  
the season.

Col. Brown thanked the ratepay-  
ers for returning him to Council  
by acclamation. He reviewed the  
financial statement pointing out  
errors during the year, one of the  
main items being the taking over  
of the 8th line bridge by the  
County. He referred to the addi-  
tional polling places for the con-  
venience of voters and also touch-  
ed a very important point when he  
referred to some suits, and stated  
that he suggested some change in  
the rate system in order to get better  
results for the money expended,  
and believed, where at all possible,  
township work should be given to  
residents of the municipality. He  
would do his duty in the best in-  
terests of all the compliments of  
the season.

Thos. L. Leslie, after expressing  
thanks to those who returned him  
to office, referred to the state of  
labor and believed better results  
would be achieved by commencing  
and receiving 20 per cent. from  
the government. He also spoke re-  
garding the damage done to the  
roads by heavy trucks, and stated  
that he suggested some change in  
the rate system in general, and wished  
all the compliments of the season.

Wm. Gowdy thanked the rate-  
payers for again electing him  
Councillor. It had been a pleas-  
ure during the past year to trans-  
act the business of the township  
with such splendid men. He wish-  
ed the Council. He urged all to  
make their wants known and  
the Council would endeavor to as-  
sist them. He would do his duty  
to all during 1924, and wished all  
a Happy New Year.

Others who spoke were Mc-  
Evee J. L. Standish, R. C. Mc-  
Cullough, J. R. Lindsay and Jas.  
McDowell, most of their remarks  
being complimentary.
