Obituary

ROBERT FRANKLIN BENNEY
The oldest resident in Georgetown,
a native of the township,
passed away on Monday January
7th in the person of Robert Frank-
lin Benney son of the late John
Reed Benney and Jerusha Free-
man, in his 94th year. Born on
the creek line 1/4, concession of
Esquimaux on the farm that has
later been known as the Denison
farm. Mr. Benney in early life
went to school above Georgetown
from his uncle Freeman's on what
is now the Armstrong farm. Dur-
ing the rebellion of 1837 with his
sister he attended school on his
father's farm from where he re-
membered seeing his father taken
prisoner. In early life he married
Mary Root of Erin and lived on
the adjoining farm which Mr. Ben-
ney often spoke of as being an ex-
tremely stony one but in spite of
difficulties proved a very success-
ful farmer, being a specialist in
wheat and apple growing. In 1904
he married Jessie E. Webb who
cared for him in his declining years.
Coming to Georgetown with him
in 1907 and making a home near
the church to which he and his
brother, J. Smith Benney, gave so
magnificently of their means to
erect as well as the splendid par-
sonage. To the long line of mem-
bers who have served the Geor-
getown Baptist church since its or-
ganization in 1847, Mr. Benney al-
ways proved himself a real friend.
No pastor could have a more loyal
and devoted deacon. During the
last two years he was taken to
church regularly in a wheel chair
to within one week of his death,
keeping in touch with the church
which has been his intellectual to
the last made possible. At the last
annual meeting of the church Mr.
Benney gave such a stirring address
published in the Herald in which
gave him real joy in reading to
some of his friends within a week
of his death. The funeral service
was held in the church, being con-
ducted by his pastor Rev. J. H.
Moore, assisted by former pastors
Rev. A. E. St. Dalmas, Rev. W. B.
McAlpine and Rev. Gordon Holmes,
in addition to Rev. Dr. P. K. Day,
Rev. J. W. Edwards and Rev. Mr.
Caldwell of the Methodist
church. Of his former living phi-
lans Dr. Olin and Rev. E. P. Jones
were unable to attend and Dr.
Sowerby could not be located.
