In early life he married Mary Root of Erin and lived on the adjoining farm which Mr. Bessey often spoke of as being an extremely stony one but in spite of difficulties proved a very successful farmer, being a specialist wheat and apple growing. In 1904 he married Jessie E Webb who cared for him in his declining days. Coming to Georgetown with him in 1907 and making a bome near the church to which he and his brother, J. Smith Bessey, gave so magnificiently of their means to erect as well as the splendid parsonage. To the long line of pastors who have served the Georgetown Baptist church since its organization in 1847, Mr. Bessey always proved himself a real friend. No pastor could have a more loyal and devoted descon. During the last two years he was taken to church regularly in a wheel obair to within one week of his death keeping in touch with the church which his keen intellect to the last made possible. At the last annual meeting of the church Mr. Bessey gave such a stirring address published in the Herald, which gave him real joy in reading to some of his friends within a week of his death.
