Two more periods of 10 minutes each followed with the same result, both teams putting forth every effort to break the tie without success. In the third extra period Georgetown came back strong while the visitors appeared to be weakening and a neat piece of work by Bush landed the puck at the Orangetown end of the ice and passed to Small who scored. During the next five minutes another goal was added by a pretty combination play of Blackburn and Small, leaving the result when time was finally called, Georgetown 2, Orangetown 0.

About the end of the first period Douglas received a nasty cut above the eye and another on the lip which he left on the ice and was struck by another player's skate, necessitating his retirement from the game. Then in the third period when Georgetown was getting much the better of the play, Duncan, the goal keeper, received a severe cut on the face when the puck hit him, and his day's work was done. The two men were replaced by J. Bush and Saunders.

Every player on the team put up a splendid game and honors were pretty evenly divided. After the first period Georgetown had the better of the game and only the splendid work of Orangetown goal keeper prevented the score from being larger.

Bobby Hewelson was the referee and gave general satisfaction.
