Shifting Population A bulletin issued by the Bureau of Census presents striking figures of Ontario population, and its movement from farm to town during two decades. Counting cities, towns and incorporated villages as "urban," the rest of the province as "rural," the following comparison is available:

1901 1921 Rural.....1,240,969 1,230,292 Urban..... 985,978 1,707,870 The rural population, despite the opening up of New Ontario, has not quite held its own. The urban population has nearly doubled. There are 24 cities instead of 14; 142 towns instead of 99. The incorporated villages have shared the fate of the countryside. Though the total population crossed in number from 140 to 149, their population has shrunk from 145,707 to 120,568.

The drift of population from rural sections and small centres into the big cities is not good in any respect for the Province of Ontario.

New Plant Introductions The Canadian Horticultural Council has accepted for recording several new varieties of plants. These will be listed in the official trial plots and, if found to possess outstanding merits, will be registered and certificated, thus protecting the originator. The registrations hitherto submitted and accepted for recording include three varieties of the gladiolus, two varieties of the chrysanthemum, one rose and a new straw berry.

Canada at British Empire Exhibition

Showing the Canadian Pavilion, at Wembley, under course of construction. As portions of the Canadian space allotment have been given over to the two great railway systems, the building which will house the Government exhibits will be somewhat smaller than those of other Dominions, but a great deal of time and money has been spent on its design and decoration, with the result that it promises to be the gem of the British Empire Exhibition. The photograph shows the progress made up to the end of December.

Inset is shown the entrance to the Canadian Pacific pavilion. This building is grouped with the Canadian Government pavilion with which it has been designed to harmonize. A massive simple entrance, two stories high, deeply recessed with painted and coffered ceiling, richly colored doors and grilles of Canadian wood, approached by a broad flight of steps flanked on either side by a bronze moose and buffalo, is the centre of a facade enriched with decorated panels and columns. The strong color scheme of this entrance is emphasized at night by a unique lighting effect.

A visitor to the Canadian buildings will find displayed to good advantage examples of all Canadian natural and manufactured products, and agricultural exhibits which cannot but impress him with the magnitude of the resources of this Dominion and the vast opportunities which await the immigrant and settler.

"And did it bark at you?" he was asked. "Oh, yes," he replied. "Each day a bergschrund is not a bird. It is a huge crevasse where the ice has slipped down the rock wall and cracked. The next stumbling block we came to was a chimney. This is a hard rock, and your feet against the other and doing what you call on this side the chimney till you get to the top. It is a great life, this one of mountain-climbing, especially higher up where the glaciers are. You see a river of ice with a depth of sometimes five 1,000 feet. Great crevasses reach down, it seems, to without end.
