Mr. Davies received his first telegraph experience with the Western Union Company at Helena, Montana. On January 1, 1906, he commenced his career with the Great North Western Telegraph Company, starting at Ottawa as Chief Operator. NOTICE is hereby given that the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Georgetown in the County of Halton will apply to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario at its next session for an Act:

1. To consolidate the floating debt of the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Georgetown, amounting to the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000).
2.
