About Norval

In 1820 James McNab settle on the River Credit and for 20 years the place was called MoNab- Scotland. ville. In 1840 a post office was established and called Norval with Col. Wm. Clay post master. It be ing midway between Toronto and Guelph and located in a beautifu spot, had great expectations as shown by a petition to parliament to make it the county town for a new district. I quote from a report part of its growth and refer particularly to the grist mill.

"The mill was first built by the ate Jas. McNab in the year 1828 who did business till 1880 when he lessed the mill to John Barnhart who carried on the business for number of years when Mr. McNab took charge of it again. In 1886 the late General Sir Peter Adamson purchased it and carried or until 1845, when he leased it to Mesars Gooderham & Worts for 14 years. It came into the hands of the General again and was managed by his son-in-law, Col. Mitchell, and in 1868 the late Mr. Robert Noble purchased it."
