Meet Contract Waterworks
The Town of Forest occupies a rather unenviable position. The Provincial Board of Health has ordered the town to construct a waterworks system and to commence the work immediately. As a meeting of the Council a resolution was passed approving construction, the Mayor voting with the majority. The penalty for refusal is \$100 a day. The Forest Free Press has for several years advocated strongly the waterworks system as a utility of great value to the town. The refusal of the Council to take the advice will be costly to the town.
Palatial Home Burned
Fire almost totally destroyed the palatial home of W. J. McCallum, widely known stockman, on the first line east, Chingomany, early yesterday morning. It broke out about 8 o'clock in the morning. Gaining rapid headway, the flames were fanned by a strong north wind, and the building, with its valuable furniture, was razed almost completely before the efforts of the Brantford Fire Brigade quelled the flames. The McCallum home is known widely as the most palatial country home in Peel County. Its value is estimated at \$40,000, while the value of the furniture is placed at \$10,000. Insurance totalled \$27,000, but it is believed that the loss far exceeds this. Only two valuable oil paintings were saved before the flames made further salvage work impossible. It is believed that the blaze originated from the furnace.
