Deaths

D. D. Christie Dead
Death occurred suddenly on Monday at his home, 208 Norfolk Street, of D. D. Christie, well known lime manufacturer, and one of Guelph's prominent residents for the past twenty five years. Mr. Christie, who was in his 85th year, had been in his usual good health until last week, when he contracted a cold, which later developed into pneumonia. A native of Nassagawyes Township, Mr. Christie was connected with the lime industry practically all his life, and before going to Guelph resided at Acton, and later at Toronto, for a number of years. At the time of his death he was president of the Standard White Lime Co., Guelph; president of the Christie-Henderson Co., Toronto; president of the Winnipeg Supply and Fuel Co., Winnipeg, and a director of the Dremhoffer Mines. His widow and one daughter survive.

Norval

On Tuesday night of last week a meeting was held in the school house in connection with bringing Hydro to the village, at which Dr. R. T. Noble presided. Dr. Noble has interested himself to a considerable extent to get Hydro for Norval, getting in touch with the proper men in the city, and soon the project in his native village.
Mr. Purbell, chief engineer for rural districts, was present on Tuesday night, and gave a voluminous statement on the cost of Hydro under various circumstances. It was learned that a line of three and a half miles will be required to bring the power from Georgetown to the village, and to line up the poles carrying the juice from point to point.
Once the contracts have been taken up by prospective users, the township would ratify them, they would be passed to the board appointed by the government, and Mr. Greenwood had been assured that only two or three months at the most would elapse before Norval would glitter in the evening with Hydro light.
