Fifty Years Ago

The following item which will be of interest to many of our readers was clipped from the Illustrated London News of August 2nd, 1878:

"On St. James Day the church of Notgrove, Gloucestershire, was reopened by the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol, after its complete restoration. The present Rector, the Rev. Dr. F. Vigers, is the first resident Rector for nearly a hundred years. He has built and maintained a school for the children of the parish; he has restored the rectory, converting what was a dilapidated farmhouse into a picturesque and comfortable residence, without destroying the character of the medieval parsonage; two years ago, assisted by personal friends, he restored the church; and now, by the help chiefly of two of the Oxford colleges, who have recently become the principal landed proprietors of the parish, he has completed the restoration of the church. Corpus College gave 500 Pounds to the work, Christ Church 300 Pounds, and the Warneford trustees a handsome grant. The architect is Mr. J. E. K. Oakeley, Waterloo road, Hammersmith."

The Mr. Cutts referred to was a Georgetown and esteemed resident of the town for several years before his recent removal to Acton.

Changes in Egg-Grading Laws

Some important modifications in the egg grading regulations for the Dominion were announced last week by Dr. J. H. Gradale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. Herebefore a dealer had to send in returns to the department of all the grades he had in stock. Now he will be allowed to send in his returns for two grades only.—Also, a dealer who was sending under 100 cases of eggs had to have these graded before shipping from one province to another. By the new regulation the quantity to be graded before shipment will be up to carload lots. It is hoped by the department that the enforcement of the regulations will be much easier by these changes, and that any irritation previously caused will be removed.
