Here and There

The Canadian Pacific steamer Empress of Britain will arrive at Quebec about 10 p.m. next voyage from Liverpool as a cabin-class steamer under her new name Montserrat. She is the fastest vessel sailing out of Liverpool and is scheduled to run from there to Quebec in six and a half days.

British Columbia's payroll for 1923 was \$150,000,000, according to the annual report of the Workmen's Compensation Board. The payroll for 1922 was \$122,592,562, and for 1921, \$130,099,372. Employment in the province at the end of last year numbered 6,524, an increase of 144,000 over the previous year.

The 1924 season for the port of Montreal was officially opened on the morning of the 18th of April, when the Government ice-breaker Lady Grey arrived in the harbor. A big season is anticipated, especially by the Canadian Pacific steamships, whose vessels on the St. Lawrence route this year will exceed 197,000 gross tons.

Vancouver this season has beaten Portland, the great wheat port of the Northwest and formerly the great wheat port of the Pacific. Portland includes flour in its wheat totals, Vancouver does not. According to the report of the American city has moved over 29,000,000 bushels of wheat to date. Vancouver has moved over 30,000,000 bushels, exclusive of a very considerable quantity of flour.

The much prized Wilder silver medal, the highest award of the American Pomological Society, the oldest horticultural body in America, has been awarded to the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa for the sixth time. On this occasion was given for the Lobo apple, one of the many fine varieties of Michigan apples originated at the Central Farm.

An estimate of \$1,500,000 for fire protection and management of forest reserves has been placed before the Government by the Minister of the Interior. The latter stated that more drastic measures of fire prevention would be taken this year as the result of the Department of the Interior proposals to utilize the Royal Canadian Air Force for the detection of fires.

Four business places were burglarized in Mt. Forest one night last week.

Those who have occasion to go to Toronto will do well to remember that that city has started daylight saving for this summer and there is an hour difference in the time.

Direct Withdrawals
The Post Office Department has made arrangements and issued instructions to postmasters of savings banks offices to permit direct withdrawals by savings bank depositors from the post office of any sum up to \$25 without having to make application to the Department at Ottawa, as has been the practice ever since the establishment of the Post Office Savings Bank in 1918.

Wedding Fee Taxable
Methodist ministers have been advised by Rev. S. W. Dean, Secretary of the Finance Department of the Methodist Church, that they must include wedding fees in their income tax returns. The ruling of the Dominion Commissioner of Taxation which covers the point is as follows: "Broadly, it may be said that when a sum of money is given to the incumbent of an office or calling or profession in respect of his services as incumbent, it accrues to him by reason of his office, and is accordingly, taxable income."
