He was successful in his farming and amassed a competence which enabled him to retire to a most comfortable home in Brampton. He was a member of the Tramp-ton Presbyterian Church. Besides his widow he is survived by three sons—Edward of Brantford, Herbert of Georgetown and Chas. of Huttonville; and two daughters, Mrs. E. McCracken and Mrs. N. McCracken of Streetsville.

### Orangemen and True Blues

#### Attend Divine Service in Knox Church

What was probably the largest Society parade ever held in Georgetown took place last Sunday night when over two hundred Orangemen and True Blues marched from their Lodge Rooms at the Arena to Knox Church to attend divine service.  
Besides the officers and members of L.O.L. No. 245, Georgetown, in charge of Worshipful Master Nelson Cook, and Halton's Pride True Blues in charge of W. M. Nellie Long, there were brethren present from Milton, Oakville, Campbellville, Acton, Guelph, Erin and Glenora.  
District Deputy Grand Master Fred McNally was master of ceremony while the Glen Fyfe and Drum Band supplied music for the parade.  
The preacher of the occasion was Rev. W. M. McKay who delivered an inspiring sermon ever listened to by Orangemen in this section. The Scripture Lesson was read from the 6th Chapter of Deut., after which the speaker chose as his text the 6th verse of the 187th Psalm. "If I forget thee, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget her cunning."  
Mr. McKay made a strong appeal for true patriotism and warned his hearers not to forget their country and its future in the mad race for wealth and position. The emigrants from Central Europe because of their illiteracy and adherence to the Church of Rome are a menace to our Dominion. True patriotism and the instruction of our children in the schools means much for the future of Canada, and Orangemen as a body have a large share of the responsibility of inculcating true patriotism and citizenship into the coming generation.

A communication was read from Miss H. Godfrey of Guelph, applying for a position on the teaching staff.  
Tenders for sixty tons of Pocahontas coal were received from J. H. Fryer Co., F. Rogers and Co., J. McDonald and J. B. Mackenzie.  
Moved by Mrs. Kennedy and Harrison that the tender of Mr. John McDonald for 60 tons of Pocahontas smokeless lump coal, No. 3 vein, at \$10.25 per ton, to be delivered in July or August, be accepted.—Carried.  
Moved by Crichton and Mackenzie that the secretary be instructed to inform the teachers of the staff that they have been engaged again at their present salaries.—Carried.  
Moved by Mackenzie and Harrison that the secretary be instructed to notify the Council that the Board will require the \$12,000 to cover expenses for the year 1934; also, that the Board request that when the Council is sending out their tax statements that the mill rate for Public School purposes be inserted in the space provided.—Carried.
