

OLD AGE PENSIONS of \$20 s month to begin at the age of 70 have been approved by the special committee appointed for the purpose and will be recommended to the House of Commons. It is estimated by the committee that the number of persons requiring to be pensioned under the plan would be 98,800, or approximately 40 per cent. of the total population of the Dominion at the age of 70.
