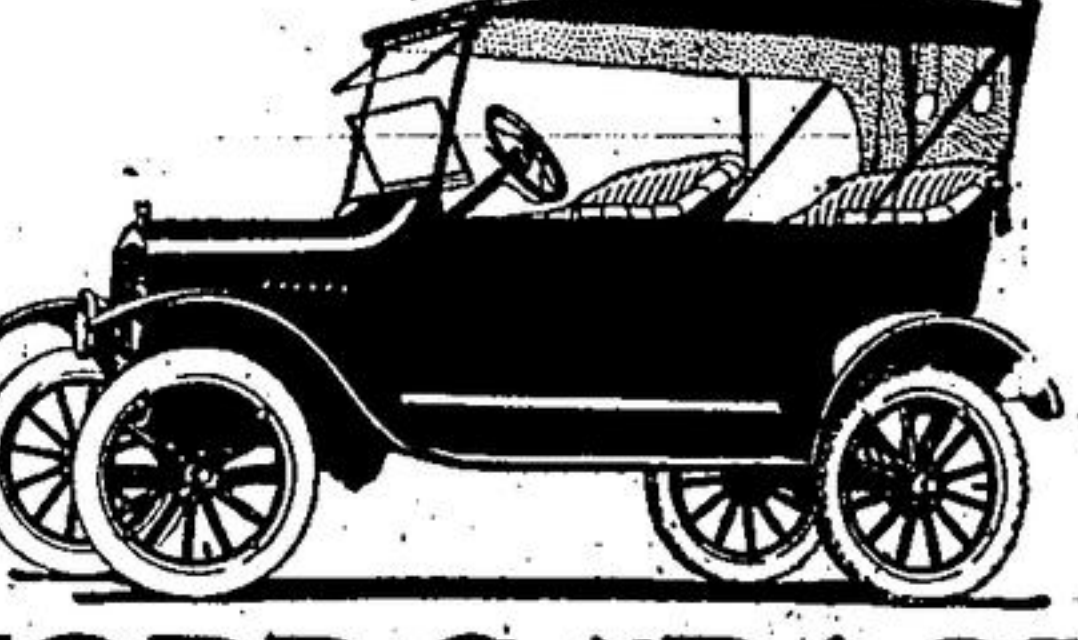

### Notes and Comments

A FORMER RESIDENT who visits Georgetown occasionally and who appreciates an effort to make a old town look neat and well kept, said to us the other day:—"I should like to remark that, in my opinion, more attention should be given to the proper upkeep of the cemetery. Many of the plots are neglected; some of the headstones are broken or lying on the ground, and indeed there is general need for a greater interest on the part of those whose departed friends have been laid away in this sacred plot. How would it do to set apart two weeks every year, say early in June, for putting the cemetery in order? And then some attention should be given to it all through the summer season."

THE ADVENT of warm weather has brought the usual Saturday night throngs to town. Everyday is asked to see them come. Like all other good things, however, the situation is not permanent. Many of the merchants feel that some of their customers are not quite fair in putting off their shopping until the last thing before leaving for home. It seems not unreasonable to ask that shopping be done early and the social activities relegated to the time after business is transacted. We believe that customers would see the point if they would for a moment place themselves in the place of the clerks in the various stores. These clerks, under existing conditions, work on Saturdays from fourteen to sixteen hours—an unfair strain at any time and particularly in the hot weather. Shop early and make the other fellow think well of you.

### OLD AGE PENSIONS OF \$20 A MONTH

to begin at the age of 70 have been approved by the special committee appointed for the purpose and will be recommended to the House of Commons. It is estimated by the committee that the number of persons requiring to be pensioned under the plan would be 98,800, or approximately 40 per cent. of the total population of the Dominion at the age of 70. This estimate is based on Australian experience. The total cost of the scheme to the Dominion is placed at \$11,860,920 per annum. This is one-half of the pension estimated to be paid, the province being asked under the plan to provide the other half and to pay the cost of administering the act. Residence of 20 years on the part of a British subject is fixed as a condition of pensionability, while aliens must be naturalized and must reside here for 25 years in order to qualify.

### SCHOOL FAIR REORGANIZATION

One of the most important reports presented at the 17th annual conference of agricultural representatives of the Ontario department of agriculture in session at the O.A.C., Guelph, last week, was that of the committee on junior extension which pointed out that the rural school fair had grown to such an extent that it was impossible for the representatives to give the necessary attention to this particular line of duties owing to pressure of other duties. The committee felt that increased attention should come from the department of education, and recommended that a conference be arranged between the heads of the department of education and the department of agriculture, with a committee of agricultural representatives and public school inspectors, with a view to reorganizing the school fair on a sounder basis in such a way that the department of education will have some greater active interest. This would relieve the agricultural representatives to some extent of detail work in connection with the fair, so they will be able to spend more time on other important work in their counties.

The committee also approved a recommendation with respect to the awarding of championship prizes in work with junior farmers and with boys and girls clubs. They felt that the course to follow in this respect was along the same lines as is being done in the United States boys' and girls' work, where the winners are given a free trip to the International Live Stock Show in Chicago. Here they could be sent to the royal winter fair.

The report of the committee on courses in agriculture and home economics recommended that either a one month or a three-month course be held in each county or district, and where possible, a course for girls and women at the same time and place. They also recommended that special courses in farm mechanics, including plumbing, carpentering, cement work and black smithing, to be held where practicable.

The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways from Jan. 1st to June 30, 1924 have been \$114,862,558.00, being a decrease of \$1,050,562.68 as compared with the corresponding period of 1923.

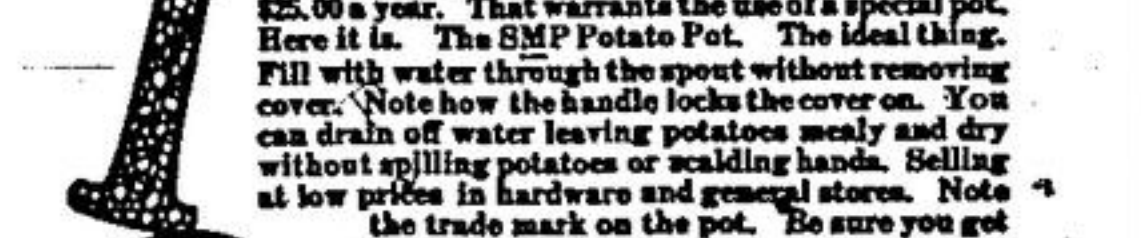

### Milton

Word has been received here that Mr. George Andrews, a former highly respected citizen and business man of Milton, who left here for the West a number of years ago and settled near Winnipeg, has reached the centenary mark and is still hale and hearty. His numerous Milton friends offer hearty congratulations with the wish for continued health and additional milestones to an honored career.

At a special meeting of the Halton County Council held here last week the county rate for the year was struck. There was an equal assessment all over the county, and the estimated expenditures for the year were \$168,984.81. On this the rate struck was 7.2 for the county and an additional one mill for good roads, making a total rate of 8.2 mills. There is an increase of about 8 per cent. for each municipality in the county this year.—Reformer.

### Norval

The death occurred very suddenly in Norval on July 10th, in her 74th year, Mrs. Big N. Choate, whose husband was for several years proprietor of the Graham House, Brampton. She was sick only two days from a complication of ailments. Mrs. Choate was born in Glasgow Township, her father, Thomas French, having been one of the early settlers in that district. After her marriage 56 years ago she resided in Glanford, then in Ridgeway, and went to Brampton 10 years ago. When they returned four years ago they resided in Norval, where they have resided since. Her husband and three sons: Roy, Brampton; Charles, Hamilton; and William, Nelson, B.C., survive her. Mrs. Choate was a member of the Church of England.
