Town Council

Council met in special session at
8 p.m. with members all present
and the Mayor in the chair.
Messrs. Kirk and Ross address-
ed Council asking for \$6000 for
new science room for High School.
Clerk was instructed to write
several of the Board of Health for
price on \$10,000 worth of Deben-
tured.
Ashburnton Herrington - That
By-law No. 10 grant exemption of
tax on lands situated within the
Corporation of the Town of Geor-
getown from taxation for certain ex-
penditure be now read a second
and third time and finally passed
and that the seal of the Corpora-
tion be attached thereto. Carried.
Herrington - Ashburnton - That
By-law No. 10 provide for consoli-
dation of the floating debt of the
Corporation of Georgetown for-
borrowing by a special issue of de-
bentures a sum not exceeding ten
thousand dollars for the purpose
of paying the said floating debt
and for the issue of the said de-
bentures be now read a second and
third time and finally passed and
that the seal of the Corporation be
attached thereto. Carried.
Near Home - That Walter Evans
be refunded income tax paid in
1923, he having filed an affidavit
with the Clerk and according to
the same he is not entitled to pay
any income tax. Carried.
Metcalfe - Arnold - That this
Council grant \$3000 to the High
School Board for the fitting up of
a new science room. In case of ex-
penditures exceeding \$5000 the ques-
tion is to be resubmitted to the
Council for further decision. This
expenditure to be met by the issue
of debentures. Carried.

Georgetown, July 15, 1924

Council met at 8 p.m. with
Mayor Dale in the chair, Reeve
McIntyre and Councilors all pres-
ent.
Engineer Smith of Oakville was
present to render for Guelph St.
culvert.
Tenders were considered from
S. Bonfield at \$20.10 per cubic yd.,
and A. Reith at \$18.75 per cubic
yd.
Tenders were opened for the
painting of the town hall. Tend-
ers were received from George Ford
at \$200, Dean Harley at \$260 and
Wm. Main at \$175.
Col. Brown consulted Council re
improvement of War Memorial.
The Reception Committee re-
War Memorial was appointed con-
sisting of the Mayor, Reeve, J. A.
Willoughby, Major Grant, Jos.
Moore and L. E. Pleck.
Invitation Committee was ap-
pointed consisting of M. J. Near
as chairman and other members
of the Council members of that
committee.
Chairman of streets and walks
was instructed to fix up crossing
with gravel.
Clerk was instructed to notify
Grant Contracting Co. to repair
cracks in Guelph and Main St.
pavements.
It was moved by Geo. Herrington
and seconded by W. Ashburnton
that the tender of Alex
Reith to building of abutment in
Guelph St. bridge at \$12.75 per
cubic yard for concrete in place
and excavation to be done in-
cluded in this bid, be accepted and
that to be required to sign a bond
for \$400 and to sign an agreement
as drawn by Engineer Smith of
Oakville. Carried.
It was moved by A. Duncan and
seconded by D. McIntyre that
the tender of Wm. Main for paint-
ing of town hall, appearing to tend-
er 8 cents of white lead and oil,
to be accepted, contract to be com-
pleted before August 15th, 1924.
Carried.
It was moved by W. H. Long
and M. L. Near that B. G. Arnold
be empowered to have placed \$15,
000 in the building of a new
plant of Henry Cooke & Co. to
protect town's mortgage, this in-
surance to be divided among regu-
lar insurance agents of the town,
if possible. Carried.
Council then adjourned.

Special Meeting

Special meeting was held in
Council Chamber at 8 p.m., Mayor,
Reeve and Councilors all present.
The minutes of previous meeting
were read and confirmed.
Ashburnton - Herrington - that
the following accounts be passed:
D. O. Cameron - Clearing - \$2500
\$700; Arnold Abstraction \$250;
Private Bill \$112 \$1048.00.
Carried.
Long - Near - that Georgetown
Civic Holiday be held on Monday,
August 4th, 1924. Carried.
Duncan - Arnold - that the ten-
der of the Municipal Bankers Cor-
poration Ltd. for \$10,000 of de-
bentures at 5 1/2% to run 10 years at
\$100.18 plus accrued interest be
accepted and that the clerk be in-
structed to notify them to this ef-
fect and have the debentures forms
printed as soon as possible. Car-
ried.
The Clerk was instructed to
have necessary posters printed re-
garding Civic Holiday.
Estimates were received from
the High School \$7151.00 and Pub-
lic School \$12,000.
The Council were unable to
have the Governor General Lord
Byng attend the memorial but are
trying to secure Lieut. Governor
Cocksbutt for the occasion. No
definite date has yet been fixed.
The Council then adjourned.


