WITH THE ADVENT of the exhibition and fall fair season, the effort to impress on the Canadian people the desirability of buying produced-in-Canada goods is being renewed. These shows at which so many of the finest products of the farm and factory are exhibited, afford an ideal opportunity through which to drive this lesson home. As in previous years, agricultural societies and exhibition boards having charge of the arrangements are co-operating with the Canadian Manufacturers' Association in causing cards to be placed on all exhibits of Canadian products, so that the attention of visitors will at once be drawn to the fact that these are the fruits of Canadian industry, both agricultural and manufacturing. As approximately 600 exhibitions and fairs are held in Canada each year, and as the total attendance is very large the extent to which the facts of Canadian production are brought to public attention is correspondingly great.

**Fowl Are Not Plentiful**  
Poultry producers are not looking for very heavy returns at Thanksgiving and Christmas, especially in connection with geese. Owing to a great many infertile eggs, the Christmas flocks are much smaller than last year. Ducks are a better proposition, but chickens have been kept back by the wet and cold, and the flocks usually marketed for the exhibition will be two weeks behind in some sections.

**Protect Against Exchange**  
Residents and business men of Woodbridge and district held a public meeting there Tuesday night, says the Globe, in protest against the action of the two local banks, which, it is held, are charging a high rate of exchange on cheques they cash for local people who deal with these banks. The rate, which was instituted about a month ago, is one-eighth of 1 per cent., the minimum charge being 15 cents. —
