

TO THE EQUIPMENT of the Canadian National Railways has been added the largest and most powerful engine ever constructed. It will be known as Engine 4100, is 92 feet long, and weighs 825 tons, 85 tone greater than its nonrest competitor, the 6000. Its height is 15 feet 8 inches; width 10 feet 9 inches. The boiler is 104 inches.in.diameter, or just four-inche short of nine feet. It can develop 3200 horsepower, and some idea of this great power can be realized when it is known that this horsepower is in excess of that distributed by the electrical plant of Kingston, which takes care of all the electric light and power requirements of a city with a pupulation of 25,000 people. The tender carries 15 tons of coal and 11,000 imperial gallons of water. It is estimated that engine 4100 will move on a level road 150 loaded
