The Vote in 1919
On Monday, Oct. 20th, 1919, Ontario voted on four questions regarding the Ontario Temperance Act, but the main question was No. 1, "Are you in favor of the repeal of the Ontario Temperance Act?"
That is much the same as the question to be voted upon again on Thursday, Oct. 23rd—about five years later.
People will be interested to know how the vote stood in Halton at the last vote, and therefore we have taken the returns from our file of that date. The figures given refer to question one, as that was the real pivot.

Mr. Chipman, waterworks engineer of Toronto, was present and consulted Council re waterworks.
Communications were read from Clark, Houston & Co., Auditors, Toronto, and J. A. Ellis, Housing Commission, Toronto.
Moved by Arnold, seconded by Herrington that Charles Houston & Co., chartered accountants, be appointed auditors for the Corporation of Georgetown for year of 1924 for the sum of \$225, which includes expenses. The audit to consist of all town accounts with the exception of Georgetown Hydro Electric books.—Carried.
Moved by Arnold, seconded by Herrington that By-law No. 12A to regulate the licensing of hawkers, peddlers and petty chapmen within the Corporation of Georgetown be now read a second and third time and finally passed and that copies of the Corporation be attached thereto.—Carried.
Moved by Near, seconded by McIntyre that Mr. Willis Chipman of Toronto be appointed waterworks engineer for the Corporation of Georgetown at a fee of \$120 per year, he to make at least a quarterly inspection of the waterworks system.—Carried.
Moved by Duncan seconded by Herrington that the Clerk be instructed to have D. O. Cameron prepare a By-law for the sale of debentures to the amount of \$15,000 the extra amount above the \$80,000 of debentures already sold for the new waterworks system, and that D. O. Cameron be instructed to have the necessary order of the Corporation be by-law validated.—Carried.

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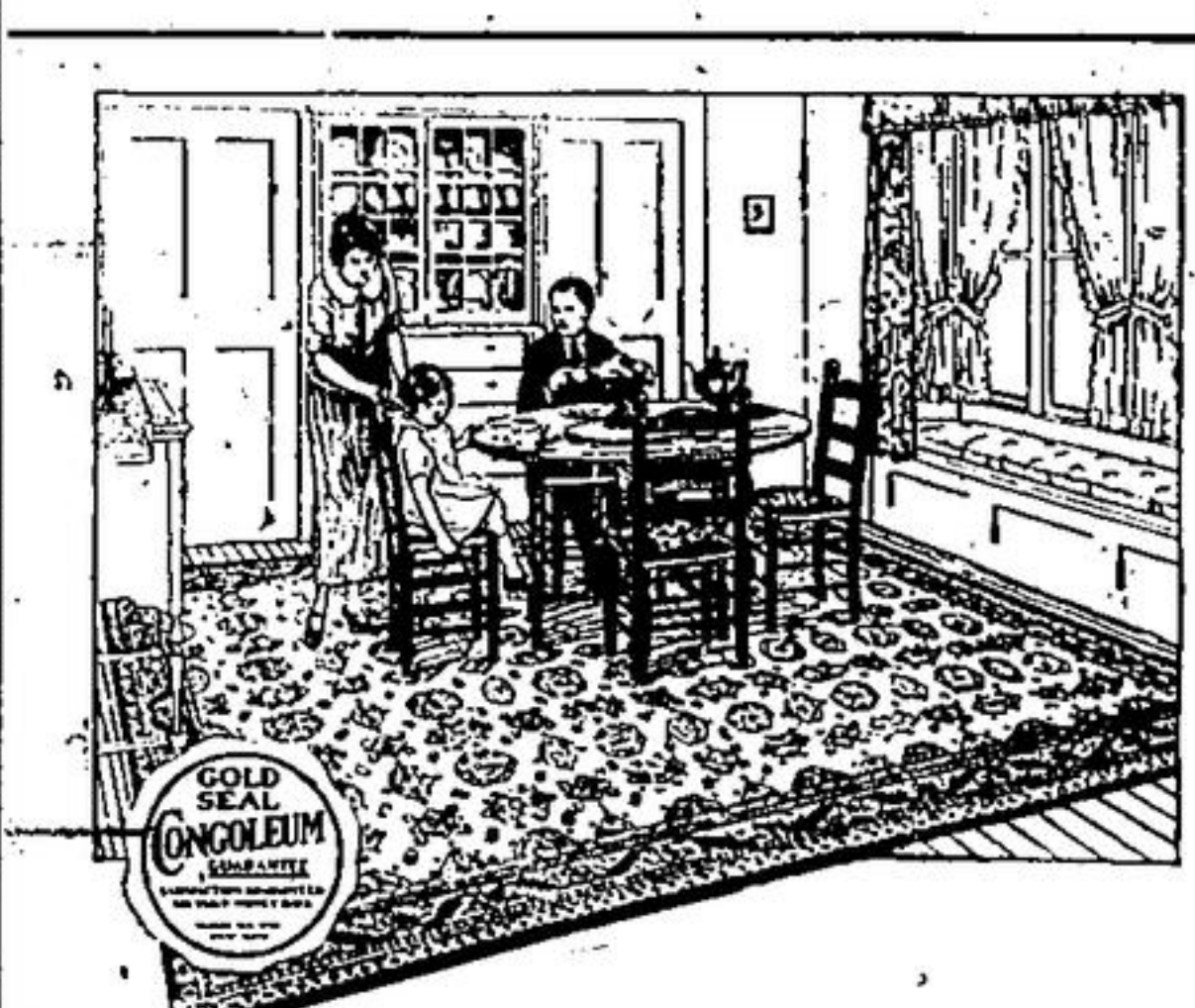
