**Paved Roads Opened**

Two pavements on the Seventh and Second Line Roads of Trafalgar Township, Halton County, were opened last Saturday by J. L. Squire, Deputy Minister of Highways, in the absence of Mr. George S. Henry, who is ill. Mr. Squire first declared the Seventh Line Road open here, whereupon the entire party, consisting of Trafalgar Township Council, Halton County Council, Oakville Town and Township Councils, Ex-Councillors and township officials and several others, among them the men who have been in charge of the road construction, were driven down the road in some fifty cars to Oakville, and thence along the Toronto-Hamilton Highway to the Second Line Road, which was then opened. The new pavement then went north, the new road opening to Postville, at which point it turned east, back to Postville, where at 6 o'clock, several of the ladies of the village served a banquet in the Township Hall to the 175 who had been present at the openings.

Community singing led by W. R. Dyer was a feature of the evening's entertainment, while gowns and dresses were given by George Hillmer, M.P.P., Judge J. W. Elliot, Mayor A. S. Forster of Oakville, and W. D. Gregory, while Major Grant, an old resident, gave an interesting account of life in the district half a century ago.

**Fatal Auto Accident**

Robert Cleave Killed When Auto  
Upset on Seventh Line

On Sunday evening about six o'clock a fatal automobile accident occurred on the 7th line below Hornby Station, just a little this side of where the cement road starts, when Robert Cleave one of Esquering's most esteemed and honorable young men was almost instantly killed.

Mr. Cleave was returning from Toronto in his touring car, accompanied by his wife and two children, and Mrs. Walter Thompson and her two children. While travelling north on the Seventh Line pavement toward home, Mr. Cleave turned out to allow approaching car with very bright head lights to pass, when his car got too close to the edge of the road, which is now too wide at this point, capsized and rolled down a 14 foot embankment. He was instantly killed. Mr. Ashmore of Georgetown who was passing the scene, stopped and with the assistance of others lifted the wrecked car up and released the other occupants who escaped with a number of bruises and a severe shaking up.

Mr. Cleave was thirty-eight years of age and the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. James Cleave of Georgetown. He was well known and highly respected in this district where he has resided all his life.

Deceased was a member of Ashgrove Methodist Church. He was also a member of Hornby Orange Lodge. The funeral on Tuesday afternoon, which was conducted by the Orangemen, was one of the largest ever seen in this section. The services at the home and grave were conducted by Rev. Caldwell, Georgetown; Rev. Griffin Thompson, Hamilton, Rev. Dougall, Norval, and the officers of the Orange order. The pall-bearers were Arthur Randall, Norman Wrigglesworth, Clayton Dick, George Currie, Thomas Browne, Murray Bridge. The remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the bereaved widow and families in their very sad bereavement.

**Ontario Endorses O.T.A.**

Citizens Vote Government Control While Rural Districts Support O.T.A.

Provincial Majority About 40,000

The Plebiscite on Thursday last resulted in a Provincial majority for the O.T.A. of about 40,000. While the big votes of the cities gave large majorities for Government Control, the smaller towns and rural districts were almost unanimous in support of the O.T.A.

In Georgetown there were 964 votes polled, with a majority of 204 in favor of a continuance of the O.T.A.
