Weekly Papers
The meeting of the Western Ontario Division of the Weekly Newspaper Publishers, held in London, last Friday, brought out the interesting fact that there are to day 15 fewer weekly papers published in the eight provinces represented, than there were ten years ago. The eight counties are Essex, Huron, Kent, Lambton, Middlesex, Norfolk, Oxford and Perth. When the war broke out there were 99 papers in these counties and to-day there are only 54. This means that the greatly increased cost of publication has wiped out 46 weekly papers, a loss of nearly 46 per cent.

Flaming Cross at Guelph
Residents in the north end of the city of Guelph were alarmed last Saturday night when a large wooden cross planted on the bank of the River Speed at the foot of Spring Street burst into flames and illuminated the whole neighborhood. Responding to a call, the police took charge of the flaming cross, which was over fifteen feet in length and which was wrapped with cotton saturated with oil. A representative of the Ku Klux Klan is reported to have been in the city recently, but, in the opinion of the police, boys are responsible for the affair, which for a time created considerable excitement. What remained of the cross was taken to the police station, where it was inspected by many curious citizens.

Firemen Attend Church

Rev. Percival Mayes Spoke Eloquent and Inspiring Words to Members of the Brigade

The members of the Fire Brigade, accompanied by the Town Council, attended divine service in a body at St. George's church on Sunday evening last, when the Rev. Percival Mayes, delivered an eloquent and inspiring sermon which was much appreciated by the men and the large congregation present.

Rev. Mr. Mayes welcomed the firemen and members of Council to St. George's and expressed pleasure that an organization whose duty it was to face danger recognized God as the one who protects under all circumstances. He chose his text from the 42nd verse of the 1st chapter of St. John: "And he brought him to Jesus."

The speaker's thoughts were based on service; service to God, and our fellow men. "The season of the year, Advent, brings to us a vision of Jesus Christ and reminds us of our preparations for His return. He has commanded us to carry the message of Bethlehem and Calvary to all men and expects our best service for the upbuilding of His kingdom on earth. We shall all be called upon to give an account of our stewardship. Membership in the universal church carries with it responsibility and the weakness of the church of today is that members do not realize their responsibility. The true Christian must live his life in the service of God and his fellow men. St. Andrew was an ordinary man, and every man's duty is to work for the establishment of Christ's kingdom according to the talents God has given him and in whatever sphere God has placed him. We are only doing our duty when using to the best advantage the talents God has given us. Communion with Christ goes to make up life and unless we come in contact with the hidden power of Christ we cannot convey that power to others as we are commanded to do. The successful man today is the man of prayer who communes with Jesus Christ. The experiences of communion with God gives us power among our fellow men. Are we doing our duty regarding service to the home where our influence should permeate the household? Is your wife a better Christian because of her husband's example? Is your husband a better Christian because of his wife's example? Are the children being taught to serve God by the prayers, example and home life of the parents? Service to Christ and the community is Christ's noblest effort in carrying out what Christ has commanded to love our neighbor as ourself. Happy is the lover that has a body of men who serve. Can you or I name one man or woman we have brought to Christ? Does our religion lack soul in it? Jesus Christ gave all for the one purpose of redeeming the world for God, and His noblest commandment is to carry on that work. If all in this church were serving Christ as they should it would not be long before the whole town would be converted. Christ knows our failings and our possibilities. Let us first bring ourselves to Christ, then we can bring others. Service to God first, then to our fellow men and by so doing we can bring men to Jesus Christ."

Upon their return to the fire hall a hearty vote of thanks was moved, seconded and unanimously carried by the men to Rev. Mr. Mayes for his eloquent and inspiring address.

There are also 102 confined in the criminally insane ward, which is also a little higher than the average number for this time of year.




