

Union and 129 against. At the Owen Sound Assembly last sum mer 426 voted for, and 96 against Union. The action of the General Assembly on the question has been in harmony with the Constitution of the church and the Parliament of Canada so declared when passed the Act of Incorporation. A claim has always been made that those opposed to Union had

increased in number. It may be so in some congregations but in all Canada the increase has evidently been on the side of Union. The noise and bitterness of the opposition have grown, but little change relatively in their numbers. The divisions of Protestanism
