The last meeting of our 1924 Council was held on Monday at 10.30 a.m. with Mayor Dale in the chair and Reeve McIntyre and Councillors Ashburner, Herrington, Duncan, Arnold and Long present.

The minutes of previous meetings were read and confirmed.

Communications were read from R. F. Smith, engineer, re pavements; W. I. Dick re water users; General Accident Insurance Co.; Grant Construction Co. re repairing pavement, and Ontario Municipal Assn.

Mayor Dale thanked the members of Council for their cordial co-operation during the past year and while he regretted some of them would be absent from 1925 Council he believed those who were to take their places would render good service to the town.

Reeve McIntyre and Councillor Arnold thanked the Mayor for his kind remarks.
