management in Knox Church, Georgetown. Now to my mind that is a matter which should not be brought to bear on the question especially on the eve of voting. This is purely a personal question, and no difference how others stand on the question each and every voter should be guided by their own conscience and not influenced by the actions of others. Neither does it matter what views the ministers of Knox Church, Georgetown, have on this question, to me it is a matter of conscience, not of religion. We are not called to go to war, but why do we not submit to the Church Union? We can all look forward to a Union, not a union to take place on June 10th next, not a union made up of two or three denominations only, but a union of all God's people who have tried to serve Him here upon earth. But the entrance to that union will not be through a great unified and strongly commercialized church organization, but rather through the medium of the twelve apostles which the Apostle John so vividly describes to us in the Book of Revelation, and which he said was for the entrance of the twelve tribes of Israel.
