**No More Notices in Post Office**  
 A ruling has been made by the Postmaster General's Department and information sent to all postmasters that "Lost," "Found," "Strayed," "Stolen" and other notices are illegal. The notices to postmasters is as follows: "Postmasters are warned against allowing notices other than Post Office Notices to be exhibited in the lobby of the Post Office. The Department is aware that pressure is often brought to bear on postmasters to exhibit notices of meetings, for charitable and religious purposes, "Lost," "Found," notices, etc., but it is considered that the Post Office should be given up wholly to the Post Office, in order that the official notices of the Department may receive the individual attention which the public interests may require."

**Presbyterians go to Methodist Ch.**  
 The congregation of Oakville Methodist Church has unanimously decided to invite Rev. J. H. McElin of Oakville to take charge of the church at the end of the present Conference year. In this way an exchange of ministers will be effected between the local church and the Simcoe Street Methodist Church at Oakville, where the present local minister, Rev. Dr. S. Dougal, will go. Both ministers have been at their respective churches for the past four years. Next Sunday the Methodist Church will be augmented by about 125 Unionist Presbyterians who, as the minority at the latter church, are leaving it.  It is not our purpose in this series of articles to go into any amount of detail, but rather to discuss broadly and basically the subject of Optometry in its relation to public well being.
