Bandits at Brampton

Rob Store After Gaggling Owner and Escape in Auto

One of the boldest robberies ever committed in Brampton was perpetrated there at 9:15 Saturday night, when two young men, travelling in a stolen car, entered Wm. Dawson's grocery store, in the centre of the town, and gagging the owner, hurried him to a chair while they looted his pockets and the store till of the day's takings—about \$150.

The robbery took place just a few minutes after the Capital Theatre, across the street, had released its patrons. As soon as Frank Gibson, who helps in the grocery store on Saturdays, had departed for home, the two men left the car from which they had been watching the grocery, and entered the store. While they made a pretence of having guns, no firearms were displayed to Dawson, whom they overpowered and took to a back room. After tightly binding and gagging him, they ransacked his pockets and the till, and, walking out of the store, drove away.

About 15 minutes later the store-keeper succeeded in breaking the chair to which he was tied, and was freed. He at once notified the police, who, knowing that the Dundas Highway was the one clear road out of town, concentrated upon it. Chief of Police Herkes telephoned County Constable W. Copeland at Cooksville, where a car was seen coming down the road at a high rate of speed. Copeland cried to the driver to stop, and, when he was not heeded, fired both barrels of his shotgun at it as it approached, but to no effect.

From Cooksville the young men evidently headed on to Port Credit where the car was discovered at 11 o'clock this morning in Orchard Grove Park, on the Highway. No blood stains were found in it, but the windshield was shattered, while the top and back cushions were riddled with holes. The owner was found to be M. F. Spencer of 74 Glenholme Avenue, Toronto, who states it was stolen from Louisa Street, Toronto, about 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

What adds to the sheer daring of the robbery is the fact that the men, who are described as being well dressed and about 25 years of age, apparently made no effort to conceal their presence in Brampton, where they were seen driving about throughout the evening.

The car, a six-cylinder 1924 model touring machine, was noted by several of the citizens, one of whom, a garage man named Hamilton, took its number as he filled its gas tank for the bandits, who inquired of him as to the various roads out of town.

Speaking in the debate in the Dominion House one day last week Dr. R. K. Anderson, Conservative, of Halton, thought the Speech from the Throne revealed nothing so clearly as that the Government was at the end of its resources, but had not the courage to step down. Progressives had realized practically none of the objects for which they had given support to the government. Their failure to do so, even when they held the balance of power, had proved the futility of one class separating itself in politics from all other classes.

Dr. Anderson saw in the protective policy the only solution for Canada's industrial problems. He urged a higher tariff on United States fruit, commensurate with its price. If fruit from the United States continued to enter Canada under a high tariff, then at least the country would have an increased revenue, but he thought that the more likely effect would be to preserve the home market for Canadian-grown fruit.

The total value of small fruits and vegetables brought from the United States in 1922, 1923 and 1924 was over \$16,000,000, while during the same years Canadian exports of those commodities to the United States were valued at but something over \$1,000,000.

One hundred and forty-three industries were located in Halton, none of them very large, but of great importance to the community, as 4000 people would be thrown out of employment if they were closed. A similar condition existed throughout Canada, and he believed that the principle of protection should be applied. Conditions were bad, but the only bright spot on the horizon is that the people will soon have the opportunity to name a successor to the Government.

Notes and Comments

A CAMPAIGN FOR HONESTY in public life is about due in this province which is supposed to have a high state of civilization. It has been suggested that the campaign among the crooked whites be carried on by representatives of the red, yellow and black races.

SPEAKING AT THE 25th annual convention of the Ontario Fall Fairs and Exhibitions last week (Jan. 10), John B. Martin, Minister of Agriculture, warned his hearers that they must make their Fall Fairs of educational value and not let sports and racing events supercede the main object of their exhibitions. These things had their place, he said, but they should not be the centre of attraction.

THE ONTARIO Assoc'n of Fairs and Exhibitions held its annual conference in Toronto, with 300 delegates present. Among the suggestions brought before the conference was that a deputation be sent to Ottawa to urge the standardization of farm machinery parts, it being pointed out that such action would save the farmers of Canada millions of dollars. It was also emphasized that there must be more attention given to the women's department at fall fairs and that the amateur exhibitor must be protected from the professional who brought back the same exhibits year after year just for the money prizes. These are two good recommendations and it is to be hoped they will be followed up.

ROBERT BROWNING said: "I count life just a staff to try the soul's strength on." What did he mean? He meant that life is not just something to play with, something to juggle with. It's a much bigger business than that. Life is a training ground, where a man makes himself fit to run Life's big race and come in a winner. And what constitutes a winner in Life's race? Money? Fame? Honor? Pleasure? These have a place, but if they come in first, any one of them, Life's race is lost—for you. If the man himself does not pass the winning post first, with his head up, his heart light, his eyes clear, Life's race has gone to a rank outsider. Many a man who has made money and position is only an Also Ran in the eyes of the Judge. The man who is not Captain of his Soul is only a crook in Life's handicap. That's the post meant, and he is right!

SIR RONALD GRAHAM, British Ambassador to Italy, has notified the Anti-Blasphemy League that the King of England sends his good wishes for the success of the approaching international anti-blasphemy and anti-obscenity conference, states a despatch from Rome. There is a continual growth throughout the intellectual world towards the education of men in this direction. We are not doing our share in this regard and it is recorded in his experiences that Rudyard Kipling felt the "bite of blasphemy more in this Dominion than elsewhere. There may have been due to the virility of our people. But surely the time has come when we might hear, as part of the people's habit, a greater refinement of daily speech. Only when we advance educationally, probably will we find the change in a perceptible way. Apart from that, however, a drive on the part of schools and parents might avail considerably. Men who should know better are the worst offenders. A boy can be forgiven much, but a senator in the office, works or playground who stains a girl's innocence or profanity cannot have anything too condemnatory handed to him.

AMH THE CLAMOR of controversy on Church Union, and the haste of voting on the question of non-concurrence in congregations, it is apt to be forgotten that the realization of Union is so close at hand, and that in about six months time the United Church of Canada will be both a fact and a factor in this Dominion. Notwithstanding the withdrawal of several hundred congregations from the new United Church, the Union will be Dominion-wide in its scope, and the United Church of Canada will consist of congregations scattered over every part of the country. Arrangements are already being made for the great consummation of the Union, which, according to the United Church of Canada Act, is to formally take place "In the City of Toronto on the tenth day of June, 1925." Committees are at work on arrangements, the billing of delegates, rules and forms of procedure, appropriate order of service, the ticket of business, and a whole series of meetings of consecration and inspiration. The first General Council of the United Church of Canada will be composed of 135 Presbyterians, 150 Methodists, 40 Congregationalists and 10 members of the General Council of Union Churches. These delegates or commissioners have already been appointed by the chief courts of the uniting Churches, and they consist of an equal number of ministers and laymen. One of the first acts of this General Council will be to determine the number and boundaries of conference to be established, and the number of representatives that shall constitute the next General Council, to be convened within a period of two years.
