Obituary

Mrs. Samuel McMaster
Death has again claimed another of our most highly respected citizens in the person of Sarah Ann Forgrave, relict of the late Mr. Samuel McMaster who predeceased her July 10th 1892. The late Mrs. McMaster died Saturday, Feb. 21st. The funeral took place on Tuesday, Feb. 24th, services at the home and grave were conducted by the Rev. W. Patterson of Norval. Deceased was of Irish descent, her parents, the late Mary Rose and Robert Forgrave coming from Tyrone, Ireland and settling in Chingacousy Township where deceased was born March 25th 1838. She was married to the late Mr. Samuel McMaster March 25th 1858. To them were born ten children, nine of whom survive to mourn the loss of a beloved mother.
