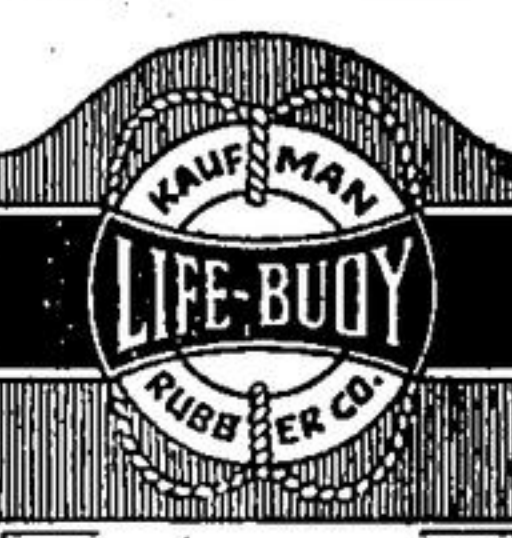
Organ Recital
