Town Council
Matters Pertaining to Smith & Stone Co.'s Fire Amicably Arranged
A special meeting of Council was held on Monday evening with Mayor Dale in the chair, Rev. McEntyre and all members of the council present except Duncan.
The meeting was called primarily to adjust matters arising out of the partial destruction of the Smith & Stone building by fire last month.
Messrs. Smith & Stone were present and talked matters over with the Council and an arrangement quite satisfactory to all concerned was arrived at. The burned portion of the building is being reconstructed, all obligations due the town are being paid and the property held by the Corporation has been largely increased by the thousands of dollars added to the building and plant.
The Clerk was instructed to write the C.N. Ry. re widening of John St. roadway.
A number of charity cases were considered with the result that possibly some indulgents will be committed to the House of Refuge.
Matters regarding the opening of the new cemetery were discussed but no definite action was taken.

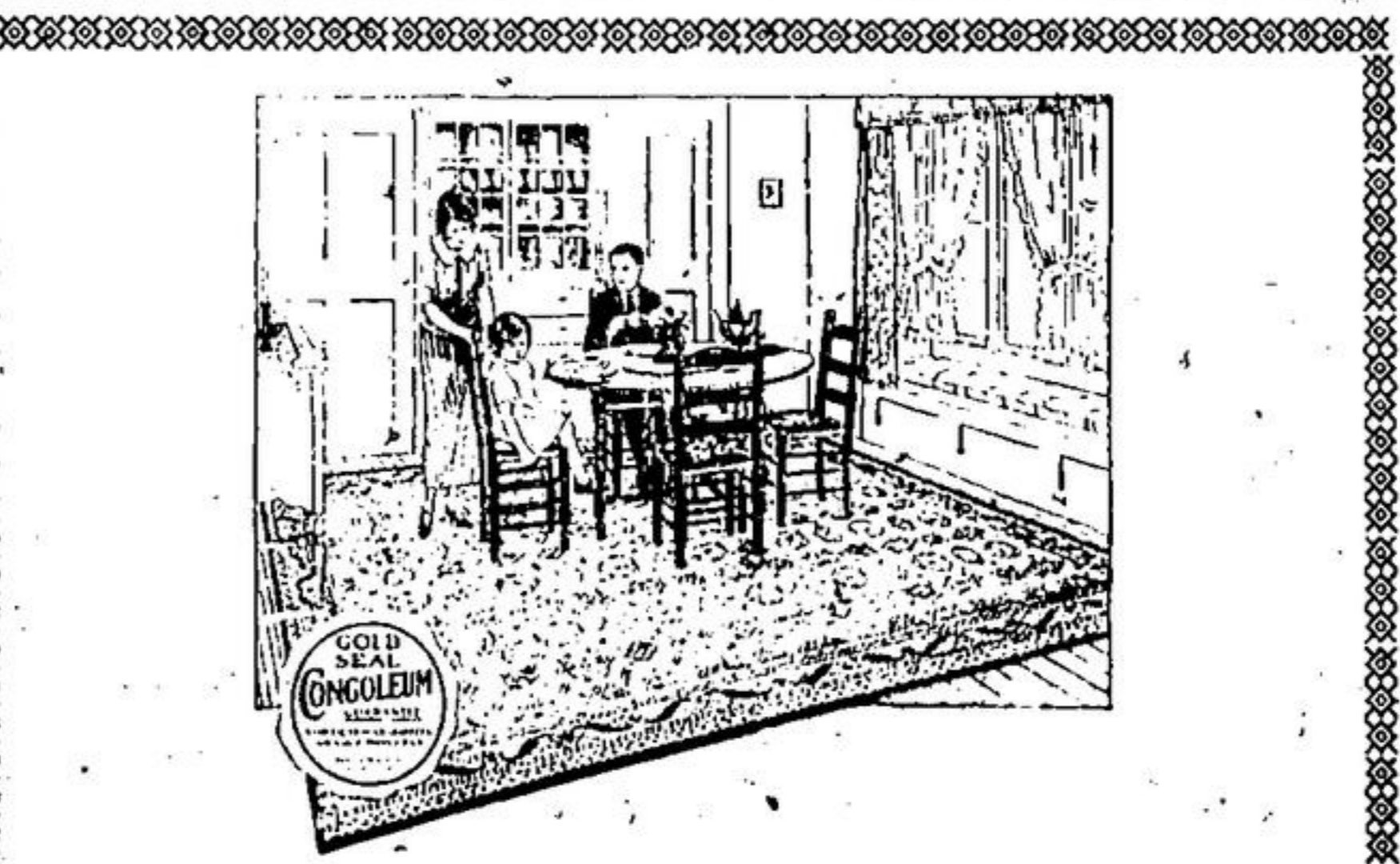
