We take pleasure in enclosing a copy of the operation of the Georgetown Hydro System for 1924 as it will appear in the Annual Report of this Commission.
You will note a net surplus for the year's operation of \$4,066.25 after providing for depreciation to the extent of \$1,335.00, which we consider a very gratifying showing.
The actual cost of power was \$1,785.40 less than the amount of the interim bills and this is standing to the credit of your municipality on the books of this Commission.
