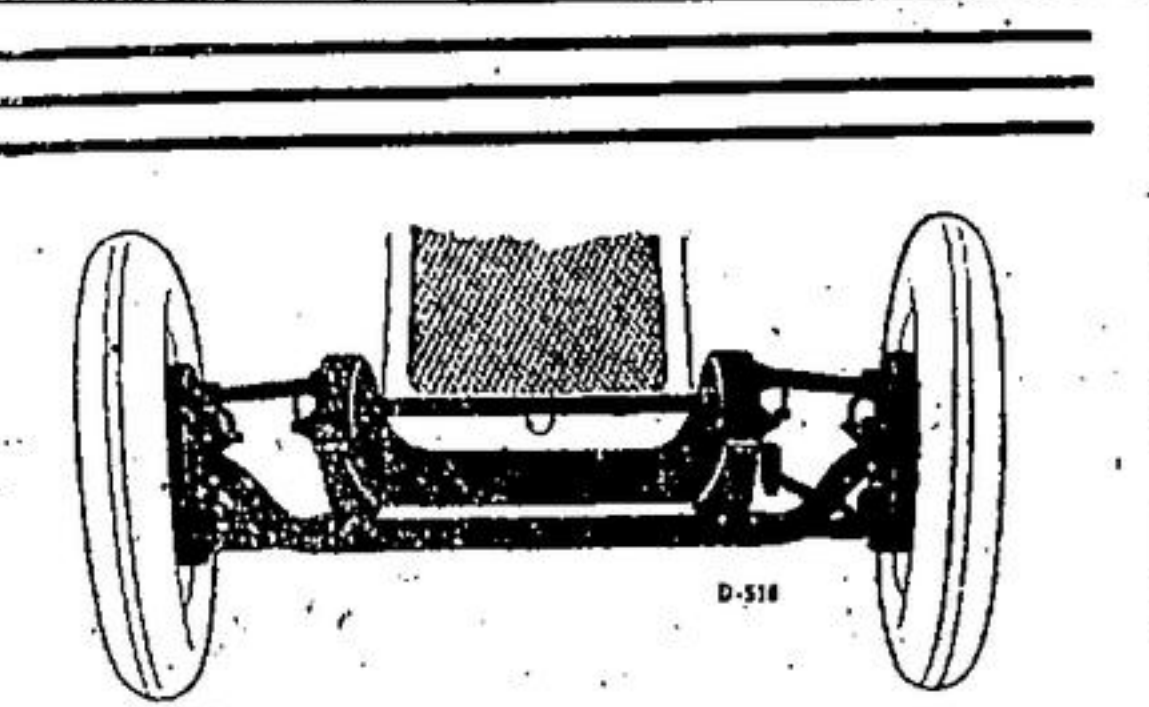

New Outlook to be Name of United Church Paper

By unanimous decision of all interested boards and committees in the three uniting churches, the name of the paper which on June 10th will combine the Christian Guardian, Presbyterian Witness and Canadian Congregationalist will be The New Outlook, the Methodist Book Committee having added its approval during its annual session this week.

The new weekly aims to be non-sectarian in character and international in interest, "a broadly religious and Christian paper, devoted to all matters of interest and value to the Canadian citizen, who is a citizen of the world as well, and keenly interested in the founding of the Kingdom of God on earth," according to announcement.

Correspondents are being arranged for in all parts of Canada, in Newfoundland, China, Japan, India, Africa, Trinidad, British Guiana and Bermuda it is stated, and contributors in the British Isles, Central Europe, Australia and the United States are also being sought.

Publication will, of course, be under the auspices of the United Church of Canada.

Leper Mission Meeting

The annual meeting of the mission to lepers was held in the parish hall of St. George's church on March 31st. Rev. Mr. Konkie, travelling superintendent for the mission, gave an interesting and illuminative address. This mission is interdenominational and the work grows steadily. It was founded in 1874 and now comprises 95 stations, 58 of which are in India. 15,000 are reached, 7,500 of them being Christians. Christian teaching is also provided at 22 houses and institutions where 10,250 lepers and children are reached. 1500 of these have become Christians. There are 19 lepers in Canada and 2000 in the United States. Lantern pictures added greatly to the interest of Mr. Konkie's lecture.

The collection was \$875, which amount may be added to by kindly disposed friends.

The C.N.R. Officials Were Here Friday

Local Electric Road Inspected by D. E. Galloway and Party.

Mr. David E. Galloway, Montreal, assistant vice-president of the Canadian National Railways, in charge of Canadian National electric lines and Canadian government merchant marine, was in Georgetown Friday afternoon last and was much impressed with our manufacturing industries and the prosperity of the community, notwithstanding the fact that things generally have been quiet.

Mr. Galloway came in over the Toronto Suburban Electric Ry. in a special car and with other officials was making a general inspection of the road. Accompanying him were E. W. Oliver, manager of electrical lines, C.N.R., Toronto; E. B. Walker, electrical engineer, Canadian National Electric Lines; H. L. Vercoe, construction engineer for electrical systems; N. S. Cumming, superintendent, Toronto Suburban Railway, and C. J. Oliver, engineer for the same line.

When interviewed by The Herald Mr. Galloway, who is supreme head of all subsidiary electrical lines of the Canadian National Railways, stated that his visit to Georgetown had no special significance, that the trip was made simply for the purpose of making a general inspection of the Toronto Suburban line.
