An examination of the eyes furnishes the only PROOF of astigmatism. In many cases it exists to so slight a degree that patient overcomes it. That means that at the cost of an excessive expenditure of energy the patient, by an automatic action of the muscles of the eye, overcomes the astigmatism.
When the error is thus overcome the patient may see normally. He cannot know that he is astigmatic, but an examination by the Optometrist would detect the error, and the supplying of the proper glasses would relieve the muscles of the eyes from the necessity of overcoming it.

The Public Health

Citizens are Requested to Comply With The Public Health Act

Notice is hereby given that all residents of Georgetown are required to wash to clean their cellars, drains, pipes, gutters, water closets, and buildings and other premises and remove therefrom all dirt, manure and other substance which may endanger the public health and to have the same completed by the Eleventh day of May next, on which day the Sanitary Inspector will commence a general inspection, and further take notice that the keeping of dogs between the 15th of May and the 15th of November except in pens of least 20 feet from any dwelling house and 25 ft. from any street or lane, with floors kept clear from all standing water and regularly cleaned, will be strictly enforced.
All citizens are earnestly requested to keep their premises constantly clean and thoroughly disinfected.
