

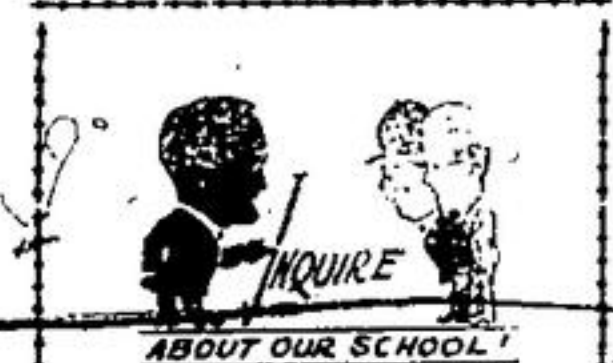

Here and There

The Good Roads Department of Manitoba expects to complete the Trans-Canada Highway through that province by October the first. This will complete the road from Brandon west to the Saskatchewan boundary.

The city of Halifax, N.S., is planning to re-establish its Provincial Exhibition this coming fall according to Mayor Murphy. The fair has only been held once or twice since the war prior to which it was an annual event.

The Canadian Trade Commissioner at Liverpool, England, is taking steps to interest Canadian businessmen in the export of crushed oyster shells to Great Britain. The United States exports 20,000 tons of crushed shells annually to the British Isles.

The official opening of Crystal Garden, Victoria's latest and finest Amusement Park will take place on June 26th. Celebrations, including a ball, processions, and sports, will mark the occasion and are scheduled to continue until July 4th.

Navigation on the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence is now open and has provided employment for hundreds of men from Montreal, Toronto and other cities who have been idle during the winter. Shipping circles are optimistic concerning the season just commenced.

It is announced that the Banff, Alberta, Pow-Wow and Indiana Day celebration which takes place annually, will be held this year, July 23 and 24 in the Yoho Valley. On these days the Stoney tribe of Indians in full regalia, hold their Pow-Wow and compete in contests of every kind.

There are approximately 2,200,000 attending school in this country. Of this number, 1,600 are at institutions for the blind and mute; \$1,000 at vocational schools or classes; 14,000 at Indian schools and the remainder attend colleges, universities, subsidized and private schools and institutions for training teachers.

With a view to arranging a new trade and transportation agreement between Canada and the British West Indies a conference is to be held at Ottawa in June which will be attended by representatives of the Governments of Canada, Bermuda, Leeward and Windward Islands, Barbados, Trinidad, British Guiana, Jamaica and British Honduras.

The gold mines of northern Ontario are said to have yielded a higher income during the first quarter of 1925 than in any similar period in their history. Estimates place the income of mining companies in the Porcupine district at nearly six million dollars and in the Kirkland District at one and a quarter millions.

John Hartney, Canadian Pacific Railway engineer, who has recently completed his 42nd year in the company's service, was the guest of honor at a banquet given by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers on St. George's Day at Smith's Falls, Ont. Mr. Hartney, is President Beatty's special engineer and was presented with a gold cane.

In an effort to individualize the name of Saint John, N.B., the City Corporation, Board of Trade, and other organizations are in future to spell its name out in full. This year has grown rapidly in importance in recent years and in addition to being the winter headquarters of the fleet of the Canadian Pacific Railway, is also a port of call for numerous lines operating between Canada and Europe as well as the centre of a large fishing industry.

Caribou have been seen in very large numbers this season in the northern part of Yukon territory. Old-timers say that the main herd must have numbered tens of thousands, while in some of the smaller herds that had broken temporarily from the main herd there were hundreds and sometimes thousands.

The very first aerial stowaway ever known was discovered recently aboard a plane in the Laurentide Air Service, Limited, operating on its Rouyn gold fields service in association with the Canadian Pacific Railway. The serious effect of the extra weight on the flying powers of the machine was so noticeable that it led to the man's discovery. As he had hidden himself with a desire to see his sick wife and child, he was not punished.

The enormous contribution to the wealth of Canada made by the Canadian Pacific Railway was alluded to by E. W. D. K.C., Chairman and President of the Company, when, speaking at Welland, Ont., on November 7th, at the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the building of the First Welland Canal. He stated that the company in 1923 dispersed in the Dominion \$202,000,000 in wages and materials, and \$7,000,000 in taxes of all kinds.

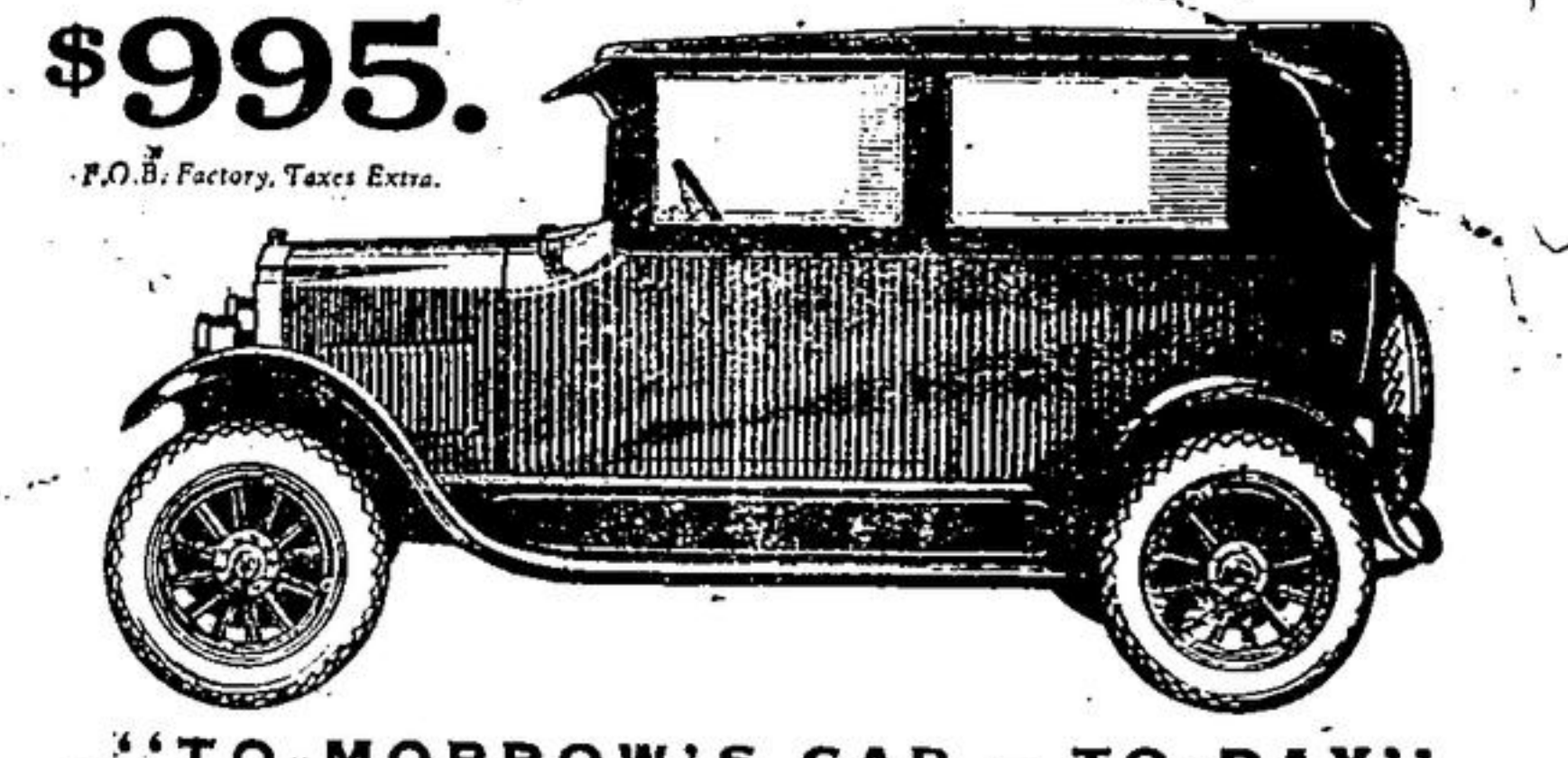
November 7th was the 39th anniversary of the driving of the last spike in the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, an event which completed the Dominion's first transcontinental railroad, fulfilled the terms of Confederation and made Canada a nation. A stone monument now marks the spot at Craigellachie, in the Rocky Mountains, where Lord Strathcona (then Sir Donald A. Smith) wielded the hammer which united East and West.

DISEASES KILL PROFITS

HOW TO GET THEM STOPPED BEFORE THEY START.

How to Treat Oats, Potatoes, and Apple Trees for Prevention of Diseases.

Anything that reduces the yield of the farm crop reduces the money return to the man growing the crop. When charges against the production of any crop are figured out it is usual to find that the costs are always high irrespective of the yield. The lower the yield the less there is to pay the production charges and profits. Production charges must be paid first. What money remains, if any, is your profit. Plant diseases and insects are always waiting ready to take your share. They frequently succeed. Dying late seasons. No injury to the farmer the easiest to prey on, eating up his potatoes, his apples, his oatmeal, his grain, and small fruit crops. There is no escape except through prevention: Plant diseases like oat-smut, onion rot, potato blight, potato scab and apple scab can be controlled.

Dry Formaldehyde Treatment for the Prevention of Oat Smut.
This method has been tested for successive years on the O. A. College Department of Botany co-operating with farmers in various parts of the province. The results have been uniformly satisfactory. No injury to the grain has resulted and the smut control has been almost perfect. Well worth while when the seeds that were sown with untreated seed showed a loss at harvest of six per cent of the crop. The advantages of the Dry Formaldehyde method of treating seed oats are its simplicity, rapidity and ease of application when compared with the dipping method. One hundred bushels of oats may be treated in less than one hour; the seed is dry enough to sow; there is no danger of sprouting, moulding or swelling of the seed. There is one disadvantage and it may be overcome by holding the sprayer close to the grain and providing free circulation of air to move the formaldehyde fumes quickly away. A small hand sprayer, a supply of formaldehyde and a scoop shovel comprise the equipment and their use gives full assurance against loss of crop from oat smut.

Treat the Seed Potatoes and Prevent Scab and Black Scurf.
In each of ten years an experiment was conducted at the College to determine the control of Potato Scab. The potatoes for one plot were left untreated and those for other plots were treated with corrosive sublimate, or with formaldehyde. With corrosive sublimate 2 1/2 ounces were used to each 13 gallons of water. With the formaldehyde pickle, one pint of formaldehyde was used to each thirty gallons of water. The yields were the same from treated and untreated plots showing that the chemicals did not injure the seed in any way. The quality of the crop was greatly improved by treatment, giving clean marketable potatoes. Sacked seed potatoes immersed for two hours in the formalin solution gave a little better results than those treated with the corrosive sublimate solution. Late Blight is considered to be the most destructive potato disease that we have to contend with—always bad in wet seasons and on low-lying areas. The successful grower does not wait for evidence of disease to appear and sweep over his field during a night; he takes time by the forelock and applies a protective spray to the potato foliage along with the bug destroying dose. Bordeaux mixture is effective as a preventive against late blight, tip burn and in repelling flea beetles and also if used in conjunction with paris green or lead arsenate in killing Colorado potato beetle larvae. Early, frequent, and thorough sprayings are necessary. The sprayings had an influence not only in increasing both the yield of marketable and total crop per acre, but also in prolonging the growth of the plants and increasing the size of the potatoes. The results of the experiment show the highest yields per acre from the plots which received three sprayings, both above and below the leaves.

Apple Scab Control.
The experiments carried on by the Department of Entomology for the control of apple scab-fungus, in the apple-growing sections have demonstrated that thorough spraying with Bordeaux mixture will effectively control the scab and give 85 per cent clean fruit. Poisons added to the Bordeaux spray prevent efficiently the growth of the fungus on the leaves and on crops that would be profitable if proper attention were given to disease control at the right time. Too many trust to luck, wait to see the damage done before making an attempt to control the evil forces that are ready to prey on the crops. The man that prepares to produce a crop with the expectation of an attack from all sides first of all and also the last shot, routing the fungus enemy with chemicals that are easily obtainable and easily applied.—L. Stevenson, Dept. of Extension, O. A. College.

Lice on Cattle.
The method of controlling lice suggested by the South Dakota Agricultural College, is to dip the cattle during the fall and spring. Dipping of cattle is not advisable, however, during the winter months on account of pneumonia. Hand treatment in many cases may relieve the animals until spring when they may be dipped. Three different treatments are commonly used. Equal parts of ground sabadilla seed and flowers of sulphur in the form of a dusting powder is a good treatment.

Here and There

Rex Beach, the eminent American author, was recently in New Brunswick as a guest of W. G. McIntyre. On leaving for his home in the United States at the conclusion of his visit, Mr. Beach expressed himself as a strong booster for the hunting and fishing possibilities of the province, charmed with its scenic beauties, delighted with its people and solemnly proposing to return with his gang next year.

The largest and one of the most valuable shipments of foxes ever to pass through Montreal, Que., by Dominion Express Company, was recently there when 35 animals in the shipment, valued at \$17,000, 30 being silverblack foxes and the rest black foxes. The former were destined for exhibition at Minneapolis, while the latter went to different points in the Canadian West.

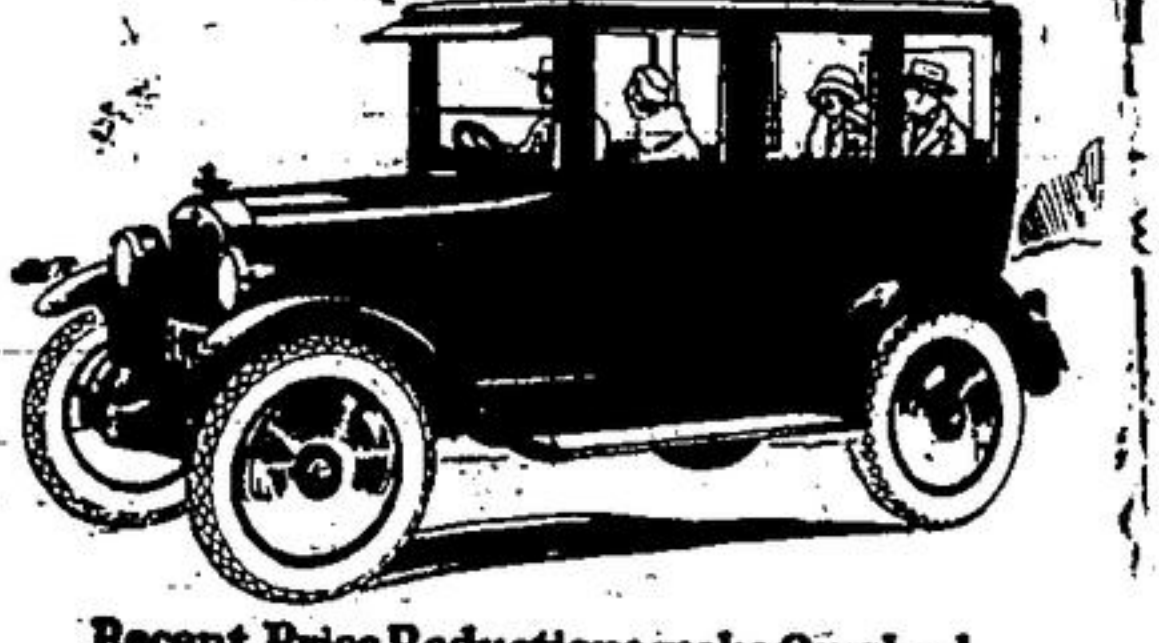
