The funeral of the late Thomas Hartshorne, who was killed in an accident while in the employ of the E. C. Frick Coal Co. of Brownsville, Penn., on Monday, May 13, took place from his father's home in the Glen on Thursday afternoon. A very impressive service was conducted by Rev. W. H. Douglas of the Methodist church. A company of Veterans and former comrades of deceased in the Great War were present under command of Col. G. O. Brown and Capt. Neil Cummings and the remains were buried with full military honors. Deceased, who was 32 years of age, was widely known having had a very active career. Joining the Canadian force in 1916 he took part in most of the battles. A Men's Banquet was held in the basement of the Methodist church on Thursday evening, May 14th, when 85 men sat down to the table well laden with delicacies provided by the Ladies' Aid. Mr. O. P. McGregor of Hamilton delivered a very inspiring address on "Brotherhood in the Church," urging all the men to take part in church work. A quartette consisting of Mrs. W. Schenk, Mrs. L. Marchmont, Mr. Gowdy and Mr. N. Cummings rendered some very appropriate selections. Mr. D. Gowdy was chairman of the evening. The Brotherhood meet again next Sunday, May 11, a.m. and all the men interested are earnestly requested to attend.

Our citizens extend their deepest sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Hartshorne and family in their sad bereavement. In which the Canadians were engaged. He was wounded in March 1918 but returned later to his unit in France where he served until peace was declared. After arriving back in Canada he joined the Canadian Mounted Police but after two years' service was invalided out on account of wounds received in the war. Being out of employment here, he went to the States where he was working in a coal mine when he met his fatal end.

Inspector G. Guthrie Awarded High Honor

Wins \$300 Prize at Police Chiefs' Congress For Extraordinary Paper

Tribute to the Toronto police department and signal honor to Inspector George S. Guthrie, chief of detectives of Toronto and an old Georgetown boy, was paid at the congress of world chiefs of police in New York last week, when Inspector Guthrie was awarded second prize and \$300 in gold by a committee of judges from all parts of the world, for his paper on extradition.

First prize was won by a police officer from Brazil Inspector Guthrie was given the unanimous decision for second prize, while a professor from Italy came third. When Inspector Guthrie left for New York he had not been invited to read a paper or had no idea he would be called upon to discuss extradition.

With no official or documentary data to fall back upon and called upon overnight to speak on extradition, Inspector Guthrie had little time to prepare his subject. Speaking less than ten minutes he replied to a paper on extradition, explaining the operation of the act from a Canadian standpoint. Forty-two countries were represented at the congress.
