### FACTS ABOUT CANADA

Canada's wheat production increased by 70 per cent. in 10 years. Some Indian-tribe payments are now made by airplane.  
Canada is Great Britain's largest overseas Dominion, with one-third of the area of the British Empire, and is as large as 30 United Kingdoms and 18 Germany's; twice the size of British India; almost as large as Europe; 18 times the size of France; 33 of Italy.

Canada's population, 105,998, on 1,224,000 square miles, is the same. More than 4,000 enlisted in the war out of 15,000 of military age. Indian donations to cash for war funds, \$44,645. 339 Indian schools have enrollment of 12,196 pupils. Eskimos, 22,024.

Canada has 17 canal systems of 458 miles, with 48 locks. The 100 miles of actual canals cost over 100 millions.  
Sault Ste. Marie canal lock is one of the great canal locks in the world, being 300 feet long, 60 feet wide, depth of water 21 feet. Tonnage passing through all Sault canal locks in 1925 was 31,000,000 tons, more than through Suez Canal in same time.

Canadians are making over 2,000 automobiles in the last three years that were formerly imported.  
The Canadian Manufacturers' Association has 4,300 members (1,000 in Toronto).

First election held in Canada was in June, 1792.  
Canada has the longest undivided land frontier in the world.  
No country in the world shows so high a proportion of home ownership in cities as Canada. London comes first, with 80 per cent.; Hamilton second, Calgary third, and Toronto fourth. Canada has constructed more than which will eventually be linked up with the Transcontinental Highway.

France has given Canada 250 acres on Vimy Ridge as a park, where the Canadian War Memorial will be erected.  
First newspaper published in British North America was "The Halifax Gazette," March 28, 1752.  
The Canadian Government has distributed over 60,000,000 seedlings and cuttings in 21 years.

One blow of a hammer doesn't build a house. One smashing advertisement doesn't build a business. It merely does its share. Each advertisement you publish aims to stimulate the day's trading. The Use of Rungs  
There has been published recently, a very interesting book on furniture, compiled by Mr. James Acton of the Acton Publishing Company, Toronto. He starts back in Biblical times, and tells of the furniture through the periods of the Assyrians, the Egyptians, the Greeks, the Romans and the dark ages, right up to the furniture made in our own day. One very interesting fact he relates about the under rungs of chairs. Many people think they are made for strengthening the furniture. Not so, says Mr. Acton. In early times, it was not customary to sweep the floors, and sometimes they came covered to a depth of several inches with litter and debris. The rungs under the chair were used to place the feet on, to keep them out of the mess on the floor. Interesting, isn't it, in view of the holler the modern housewife puts up if she sees John with his feet on the rung.

This is the season of the year when irrepresible youth does stunts and like as not gets sprains. Apply hot water as hot as can be borne, then hot poultice of bran and vinegar. See that the sprained members gets perfect rest and keep it in an elevated position. Rubbing night and morning with a good liniment, then rubbing with cold salt water and afterward with a towel to start a reaction, will soon put the part right again.

There are some people who cannot go into the woods, even at this season of the year, without being affected by poison ivy. A weak solution of carbolic acid or of sugar of lead will help. Water as hot as can be borne, as often as the itching returns and then treatment with acid solutions will afford relief.

This is the rhubarb season, but do not weary the family of this valuable spring fruit by always serving it in the same way. Vary the pie and the stewed dish by making a simple custard with milk, an egg, sugar and a little cornstarch, to serve with them. Make a bread pudding with stewed rhubarb between the layers, using plenty of sugar. Spread a biscuit dough rolled thin with thick stewed and very sweet rhubarb, roll up and bake, and serve with whipped cream. Make rhubarb and fig jam for winter use. Mingle oranges rhubarb for a complete and put in some walnuts. The day has gone past for failing to have variety in the food we eat. Some people think that is one reason why people like to eat in restaurants because there is some—because of the variety they can have.

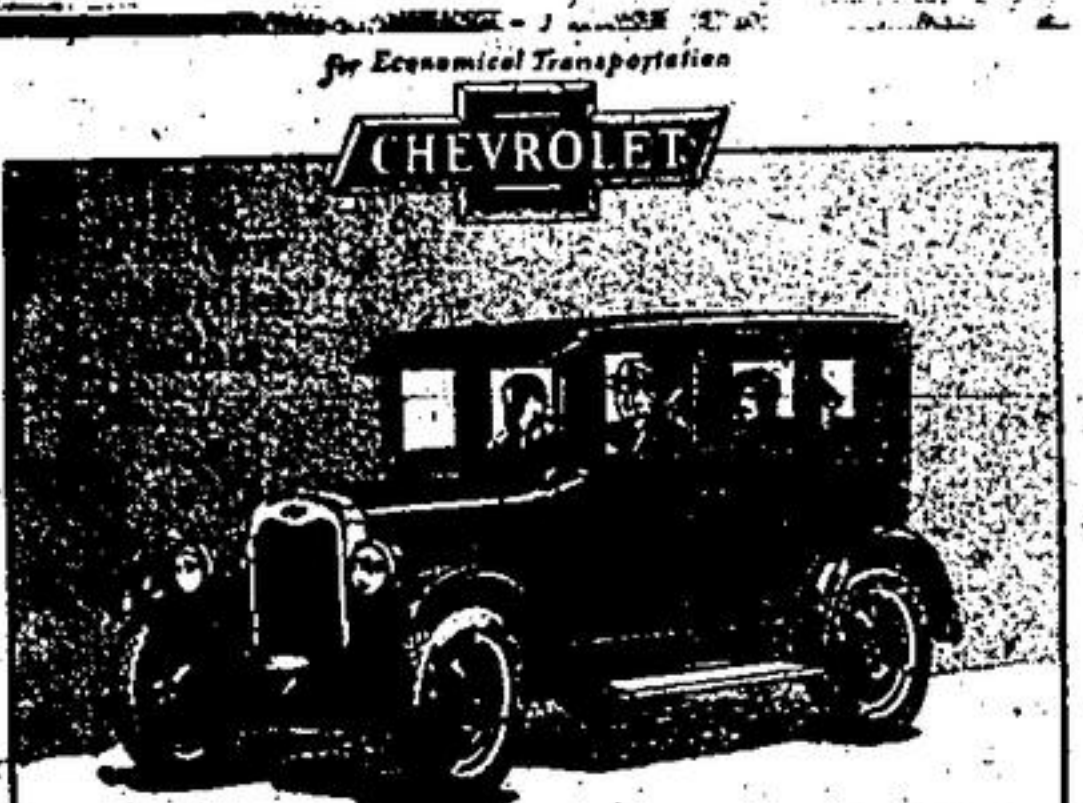
