ALEXANDER LIVINGSTONE
One of the best known and most highly respected residents of Esquimaux and Georgetown for the past sixty years, Alexander Livingstone, died at his home in Toronto where he had moved only two weeks previous, on Thursday morning May 28th. Deceased was born in Durham and came to Esquimaux when a young man 60 years ago. He was married, 45 years ago to Katherine McCosgrove, who with a family of three sons and six daughters surviving, one son John died in Acton about seven years ago. The remaining members of the family are: Sarah of London; Mrs. Clarkson Joyce of Esquimaux; Hugh of Florida, Daniel, Georgetown; Jessie, Ben of the Mounted Police force, Ida, Toronto; Mrs. Wesley of Barkas Falls, and Mary at home. In religion deceased was a Presbyterian and in politics a Reformer. A loving husband and father, an honorable man, a good neighbor and true friend was removed from our midst when the late Mr. Livingstone answered the last call. One brother Archibald of Yellowgrass, Sask. and one sister Mrs. Winrow of Sarnia also survive. The funeral took place at Acton cemetery on Saturday last, the funeral services at the home being conducted by Rev. Wm. McKay, and at the cemetery by Rev. Wm. Stuart. Knox Pastor Inducted

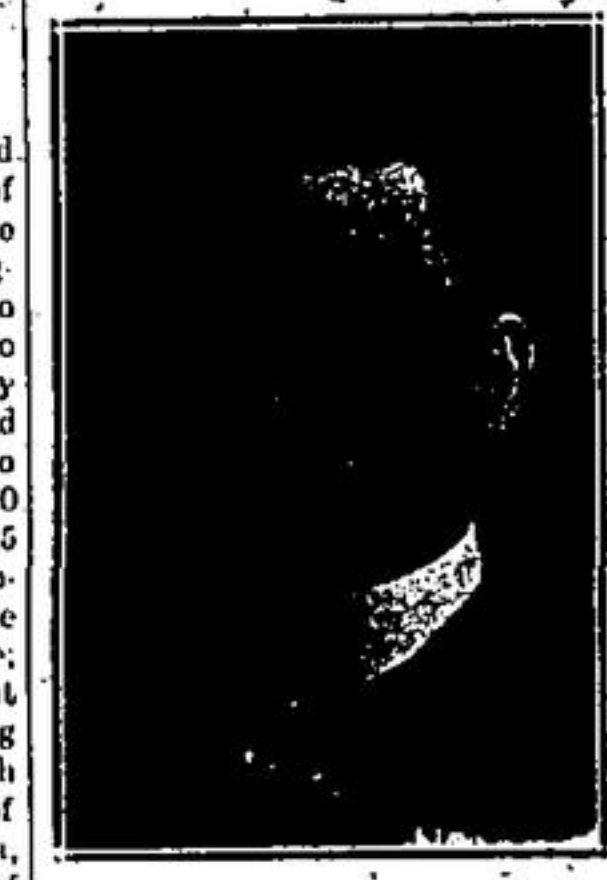
Rev. Kenneth McLean Installed With Be fitting Ceremony as Pastor of Knox Church, Georgetown.

Twenty-five Ontario congregations announced they had decided to enter the United Church of Canada without voting, as follows: - Scarborough Bluffs, Harwood, Fisherville, McIntosh, Riverdale, Clarendon, Newcastle, Orono, Ballinacree, Melville, Cheltenham, Primrose, Nono Mills, Adjaia, Mono East, Brown's Brae, Norway Point, Pakeeley, Sand Lake, Whitney, Madawaska, Harry's Bay, Painesia, North River and Botany. Unanimous votes in favor of union were reported by the following four congregations in Saskatchewan: - Orkney, Kedleston, Dilke and Edward.

Town Council

Deputations Ask Favors and Take Time and Money at Council's Disposal.

The regular meeting of our town council was held last evening 25th Mayor Dale in the Chair, Rev. McIntyre and all the members present.

The evening up to 10.15 was taken up entirely by deputations and individuals with requests on Council.

Messrs. A. Robinson and A. Herbert asked for a grant to the football club. They were given \$50.

Chief Tost of the Fire Brigade addressed Council on cars parking near hydrants and asked that the by-law covering same be enforced. He will also asked for 100 ft. of new hose and 12 pairs of rubber boots for the fire department. His requests will be granted.

Mr. B. Stone of Smith & Stone a representative of a firm which install sprinkling systems, addressed Council with reference to laying a larger water main to the electrical works to provide better fire protection. The cost of the proposed change would be between \$3000 and \$5000. The Council decided to take pressure and look into the matter.

Mr. Elmer Thompson addressed Council re insurance on electric pumping motor and placed \$1000 on same.

Mr. J. B. Wallace, on behalf of the Horticultural Society, asked for a grant of \$150 to help beautify the town. The Council granted the Society \$100.

Mr. Norman Snyder addressed Council re business assessment for selling ice in town when others sell the same commodity without being assessed. The matter was referred to the committee on by-laws governing the same.

A number of accounts were passed.
