Obituary

GEORGE FREDERICK KENNEDY
After an illness of some months Mr. George Frederick Kennedy passed away in Detroit where he had been taking treatment, on Wednesday, June 10th. Deceased was in his 20th year and was the only son of the late H. W. Kennedy of Georgetown. He was one of our finest young men and a clever student, and it is deeply regretted that one so bright a future was called away. Deceased passed his Honor Matriculation in 1923 at the age of 18 years. He was an electrical work with his uncle J. W. Kennedy, he entered Toronto University, taking up Electrical Engineering in the School of Practical Science. Before the close of his first year he was taken ill and had to undergo a very serious operation, but recovering his strength temporarily he returned to his work and passed his First Year Exams with first class honors. Besides his mother two sisters remain to mourn the loss of a devoted son and brother. The funeral took place from his mother's residence, Georgetown, on Saturday afternoon last when the remains were interred in the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery. The service was conducted by Rev. H. Caldwell, assisted by Rev. Dr. Dickie. The pall bearers were Jack Barber, Ross Cameron, Will McDonald, Finlay Allen, Bob Corke and Dan Cook, all former school mates.
