Obituary

JOHN SCOTT DEACON In the death of Mr. John Scott Deacon, which occurred Sunday at the residence of his son, Col. F. H.

Mr. Deacon was educated at Dr. Tinsie's School, Galt, at Baldwin University, near Cleveland, and studied extra-murally at Victoria College, Coburg.

Mr. Deacon was principal of Ingersoll Model School and later of Woodstock Model School.

Mr. Deacon was inspector of Public Schools in the County of Halton, making his home at Milton. He took an active interest in all public and church affairs, being a member of the various boards of the Methodist Church and for many years superintendent of the Sunday School, and for years Mayor of the town.

Mr. Deacon was secretary of the Bible society. For several years he represented Milton district at the annual meetings of the Hamilton Church and five times was a representative at the Quadrennial Conference of the church.

In 1904 he contested the County of Halton as Liberal candidate for the commons, being defeated by 140 votes by the Hon. David Henderson.

In 1918 he retired to live in Toronto, taking an active interest in Central Methodist Church, Bloor Street East. He was an omnivorous reader, especially of biography and history.

He was married in 1884 to Frances Allen, of Durham Township, County of Oxford, who predeceased him in 1919. Six children were born to them, of whom three survive, Mrs. W. B. Clements, Milton; Colonel F. H. Deacon and Mrs. R. G. Black, B. A., Toronto.

The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon from the residence of his son, Col. F. H. Deacon to Forest Lawn Mausoleum where the body was interred. The pallbearers were all intimate friends of the late Mr. Deacon and most of them had known him since boyhood.

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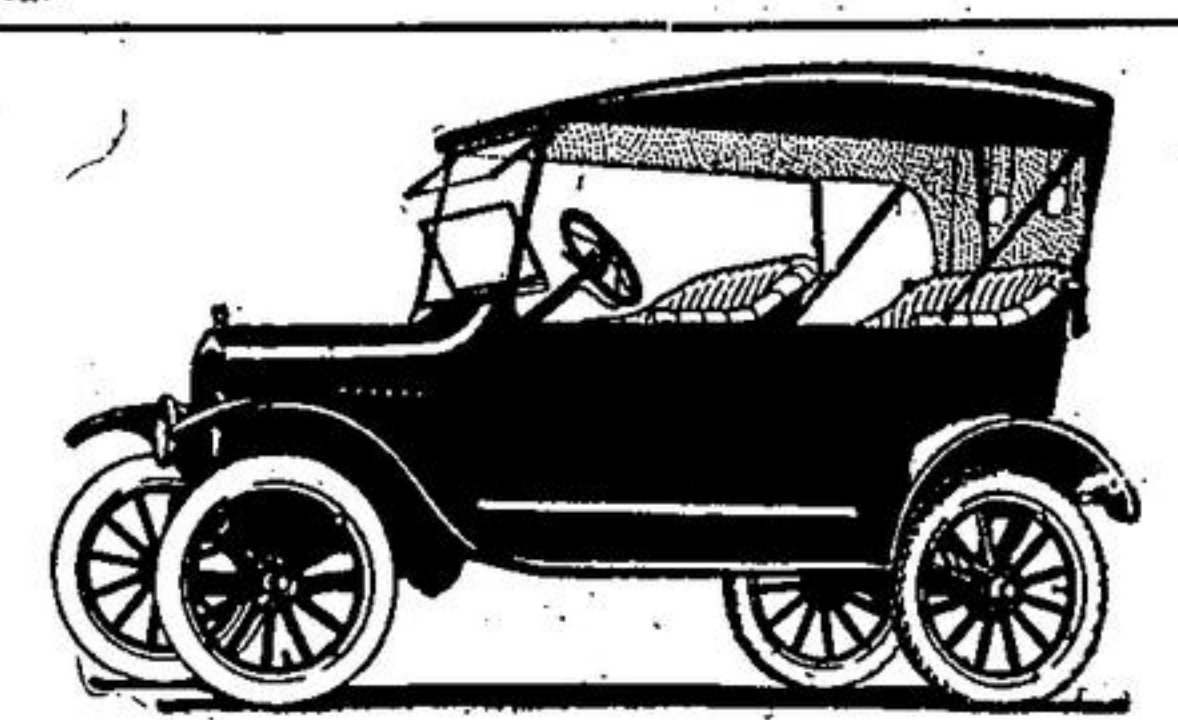
