One hundred Kiwanians and Kiwanis Queens spent a pleasant and profitable afternoon and evening at the Armenian Boys' Home Thursday p.m. of last week. The day will long be remembered by those fortunate enough to be present. Representatives of the West Toronto, Guilph, Oat, London and Kitchener Clubs were in attendance. After the party arrived early in the afternoon they were heartily welcomed by Mr. Pierce, secretary of the Home, and his capable assistants. They were escorted around the farm, much interest being taken in the boys' garden plots, some ninety in number and all nicely arranged and upkept. Special interest was taken in the dairy when some twenty boys approached their white suits and proceeded to milk the fine herd of some forty well bred Holstein cows. The visitors flocked around them and many being past farmers tried their hand at the milking, bringing the remark from District Governor Blake Halliday that as milkers they might make good sellers. During the afternoon a program of singing, recitations, flag drills, etc., were given by the boys and were appreciated immensely by the guests. The boys' leader, young Armenian and a splendidly intelligent outline of the way the work and social activities of the Home was carried on which received hearty applause. Incidentally we may say that the West Toronto Kiwanis Club has a vital interest in the Home as two years ago they took the responsibility of financing the maintenance of one of the boys. A member of the club also personally came forward and took another and he is now called after his Kiwanian Daddy, Bill Bell! In the shades of the evening lunch was served and heartily partaken of after which the National Anthem was lustily sung by the boys and visitors. Town Council
Georgetown, Aug. 4, 1925. Council met at 8 p.m. with Mayor Dale in the chair, Reeve McIntyre and all members of the Council present. Minutes of the two previous meetings were read and confirmed. Communications were read from Silent Policeman Co., Amputation Association of the Great War, Ontario Safety League, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, J. A. Whittington, McLean Publishing Co., H. G. Meir, A. G. Green tendering his resignation as Treasurer, County Clerk giving County rate of \$7044.16 for 1925 for the Town of Georgetown. Estimates were received for 1925 from the Public and High School Boards at \$10,000 and \$7,044, respectively. Tenders were opened for the repairing of sidewalks but the matter was left over until next meeting. Clerk was instructed to advertise the Crawford house, built under the Housing System, for sale. A. G. Green, in tendering his resignation as Treasurer, spoke very feelingly of the cordial relations that existed between himself and Council during his term of office. The Esquimaux Agricultural Society were given a grant of \$150 for the fair of 1926 and were instructed to close the gates to the fair grounds a week before in order to keep the track in proper shape. Clerk was instructed to advertise for applicants for the position of Town Treasurer. It was moved and seconded "That the resignation of A. G. Green as Town Treasurer be accepted with regret owing to the efficient and courteous manner in which he has filled that office, and this Council regrets his departure from our midst but will remember with pleasure the cordial relations which have always existed between the Council and himself in the fulfillment of his duties and wish him every success in his new field of labor." Clerk was instructed to write Smith & Stone to the effect that the Council could not see their way clear to conform to their wish of paying the expense of putting in a larger water-pipe for their sprinkling system.
