Sir Adam Beck Dead
Founder of Hydro-Electric Pased
Away at Home in London

Sir Adam Beck, founder of the Ontario Hydro Electric Power Systems and chairman of the Operating Commission, died at his residence, "Hawley," London, Ont., after an illness of many months.
By the death of Sir Adam Beck the Province of Ontario has lost one of its most useful and public spirited citizens. The tremendous success of Hydro Electric has been most largely due to his energy and ability. He gave himself unstintingly to the public service and a grateful province will long remember his work and his accomplishments.
The funeral took place on Tuesday when the remains were conveyed by special train to Hamilton and interred in the cemetery there beside those of his wife who passed away in October, 1921.
All Hydro Electric were closed on Tuesday out of respect for deceased.

Conscience requires spiritual direction and guidance or it may lead to serious mistakes. Many have died in the battle for freedom and the right to have a liberty and exercise it. Liberty of conscience in the bed-rock on which the Orange Order is built for the benefit of fellow men and the nation's welfare. Man's right to worship God according to his own convictions; his freedom of conscience; his Equal rights to all and special privileges to none and loyalty to King and Country are the fundamental principles of the Orange Order. It rests on all of us to make this a country where men can have freedom to follow the word of God according to their convictions. Whatever you do, do all to the glory of God. Be true to your obligations as followers of Jesus Christ."

Toronto Golfers
Spent Enjoyable Week End on Georgetown's Beautiful Course

The Toronto Telegram of Monday evening has the following:—
"A golfing excursion to Georgetown over the week end has given further impetus and enthusiasm to the exceedingly active Golfing Society of the Scottish Club of Canada. Leaving Toronto in a T.T.C. bus, chartered for the occasion, the party reached Georgetown in great form for the game, after en route owing to the repellent color and jolting character of their conveyance.
Welcomed by Mr. J. A. Willoughby with characteristic hospitality, the golfers engaged in a 36 hole series of most enjoyable games over the picturesque and delightful 9-hole course. Negotiation of the interesting second hole, with its water hazard, which is also an exceedingly attractive and well-stocked fishing pond, proved entertaining.
John Hadden, as usual, performed notably, making his first round of the nine holes in the morning play in 36, and his first afternoon round in 35. J. Ridley, chairman of the club's golf section, will go down to history in the club's golfing archives for his phenomenal 39 in the last nine hole game for the afternoon.
Following the afternoon rounds, it was found that Jackson Walton and John Hadden had tied with 74 each. A play-off from the first tee was agreed on and playing against a brilliant evening sun glare, both men drove clean out of sight. An intensely interested gallery, huddled with acclamation, the discovery of Hadden's ball hardly five yards from the green, or about ten yards from the pin, while Walton's was about ten yards behind Hadden's. This reverses the usual form of these excellent golfers, Hadden's being usually the outstanding "short" game, and Walton excelling in length of drive from the tee. The play-off resulted in a 3 for Walton, and a 4 for Hadden, whose clever approach from close quarters was outdone by a spectacular shot by Walton, which dropped the ball within a foot of the pin. Espousers of the onlookers to see play by these two fine golfers extended still further in the play-off was disappointed when Hadden's longer putt just failed to sink, while Walton's was short enough to be for a good golfer or inevitable.
Following a series of games which had been varied by an excellent luncheon, the party spent the evening at the club house with supper and music and returned at a late hour to Toronto in "fine fettle."

On The Road To Nelson

On the road to Nelson, whether on one enters from the east or west, new beauties charm the eye at every step. Murmuring pines and fir trees cast their shadows along sunny roads, while way-side flowers gladden the eye.
Even in winter, it is equally picturesque, when snow crystals adorn the trees and shrubs, with flowery jewels, their shadows casting strange pictures across the soft snow covering the sleeping earth. For winter in the mountains of British Columbia is a season of joyous sport and out of door life!
Along the way, as the Kootenay makes its downward dash to the Columbia, appear falls and rapids. Two of these are utilized for electric power, by the West Kootenay Power and Light Company, which distributes power for three hundred miles, and the City of Nelson power company, which provides its citizens with heat and light and power from this source. Beyond another of these rapids is the famous fishing ground, known as Slocan pool, where fishermen from all over the world have tried their luck through dark and sunny days.
While the fishing may take time and patience, if the season or the bait is not just right, not so the scenery for the beauty of the entire river-valley may be seen from the car window when passing between Nelson and Callaghan, where two routes are provided to the Pacific coast.
