**Here and There**  
"Barring accidents, we are in for the greatest wheat crop in the history of Canada," says Andrew Kelly, of the Western Flour Mills. Mr. Kelly thinks the prairie wheat crop this year is off to the best start it ever had.  
The first lot of Scottish boys enrolled as farm apprentices for Canada arrived recently on the Canadian Pacific Lines "Metastage". They were brought out under the auspices of the British Immigration and Colonization Association in co-operation with the Canadian Pacific Railway.

**Canada's progress in the world of letters is illustrated by the fact that there is a Canadian literary section as one of the features of the Canadian pavilion at the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley. It presents French-Canadian and English-Canadian literature from the earliest dates down to 1925.  
Ten conventions, comprising almost 3,000 delegates, will be held in Montreal between now and August 31, according to an announcement by the Montreal Tourist and Convention Bureau. It is hoped to obtain the 1926 Kiwanian Convention for this city which would mean that some 7,000 Kiwanians will visit Montreal next summer.**
