A Warning to Radio Users

Inquiry at the Bureau of Standards following the death of a listener who was killed in Pittsburg by a bolt of lightning which struck the aerial wire, the fact that about one such fatality has occurred each year since the beginning of broadcasting. Such accidents may be prevented by listeners turning off the power and keeping away from the main sets in a thunderstorm. At such times listening should be discontinued. Auditors are cautioned against using heat phones or touching any part of the set during an electrical storm, especially when the receiver is connected with an outside wire.

CAR RUNS 334 MILES AT COST OF ONLY \$4

Reports which have been received by C. C. Brooks, Chief of Motive Power of the Canadian National Railways, regarding the operating of the new Diesel electric passenger cars which are being prepared for regular service on the lines of the company are highly encouraging. The 60-foot car, returned to Montreal last Wednesday under its own power. The run from Toronto to Montreal is a distance of 334 miles, and the fuel oil consumed on that run cost \$3.50. The cost of the lubricating oil used averaged one-seventh of a cent per mile, or about 48 cents for the entire trip.

During the past week motive power and electrical engineers from several of the large railways in the United States have accompanied the car on its trip, and without exception they have pronounced it to be one of the most amazing inventions in modern transportation.

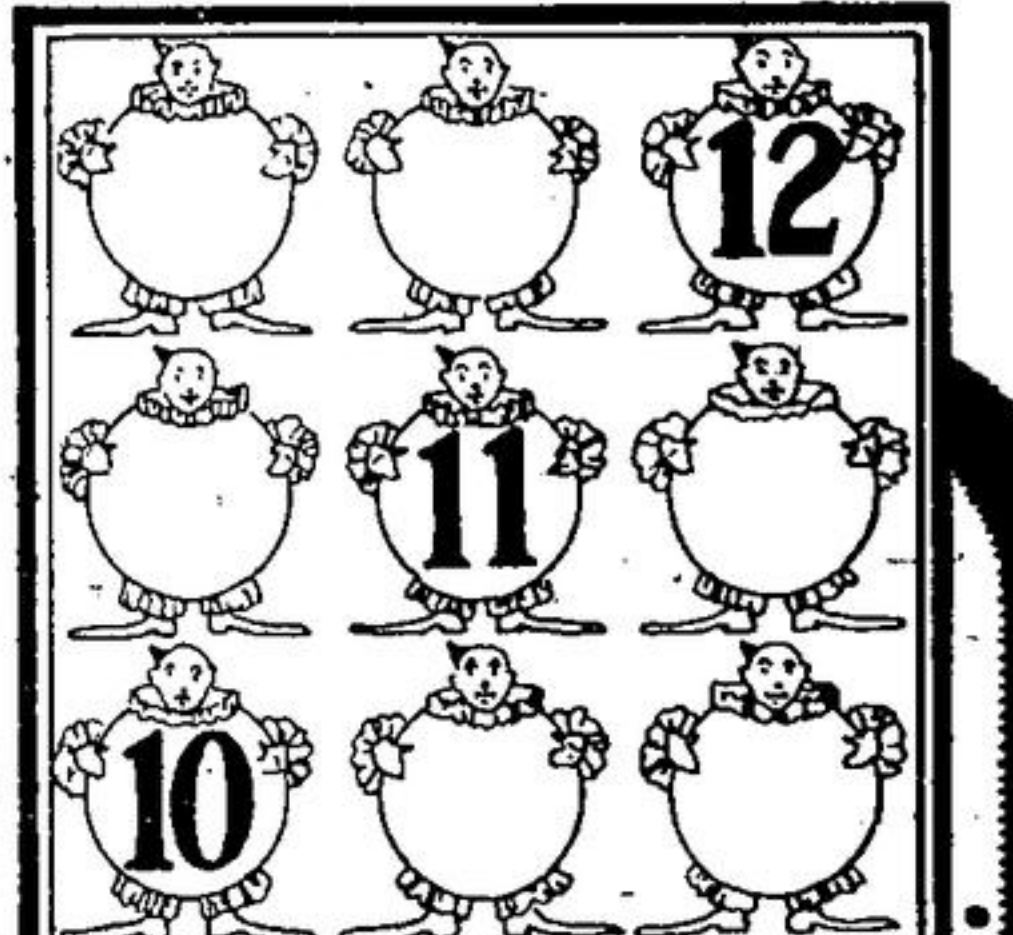
