THE DEPARTMENT of Education has issued a new public school third reader. Its present use is not compulsory, but it will be introduced when the supply of 1924 text books has been exhausted. The new reader follows the old one pretty much, except that a good deal of foreign narrative and poems has been replaced by all-Canadian prose and verse. "In Flanders Fields" appears at the back of the volume, and there are several drawings by C. W. Jeffreys, the Toronto artist.

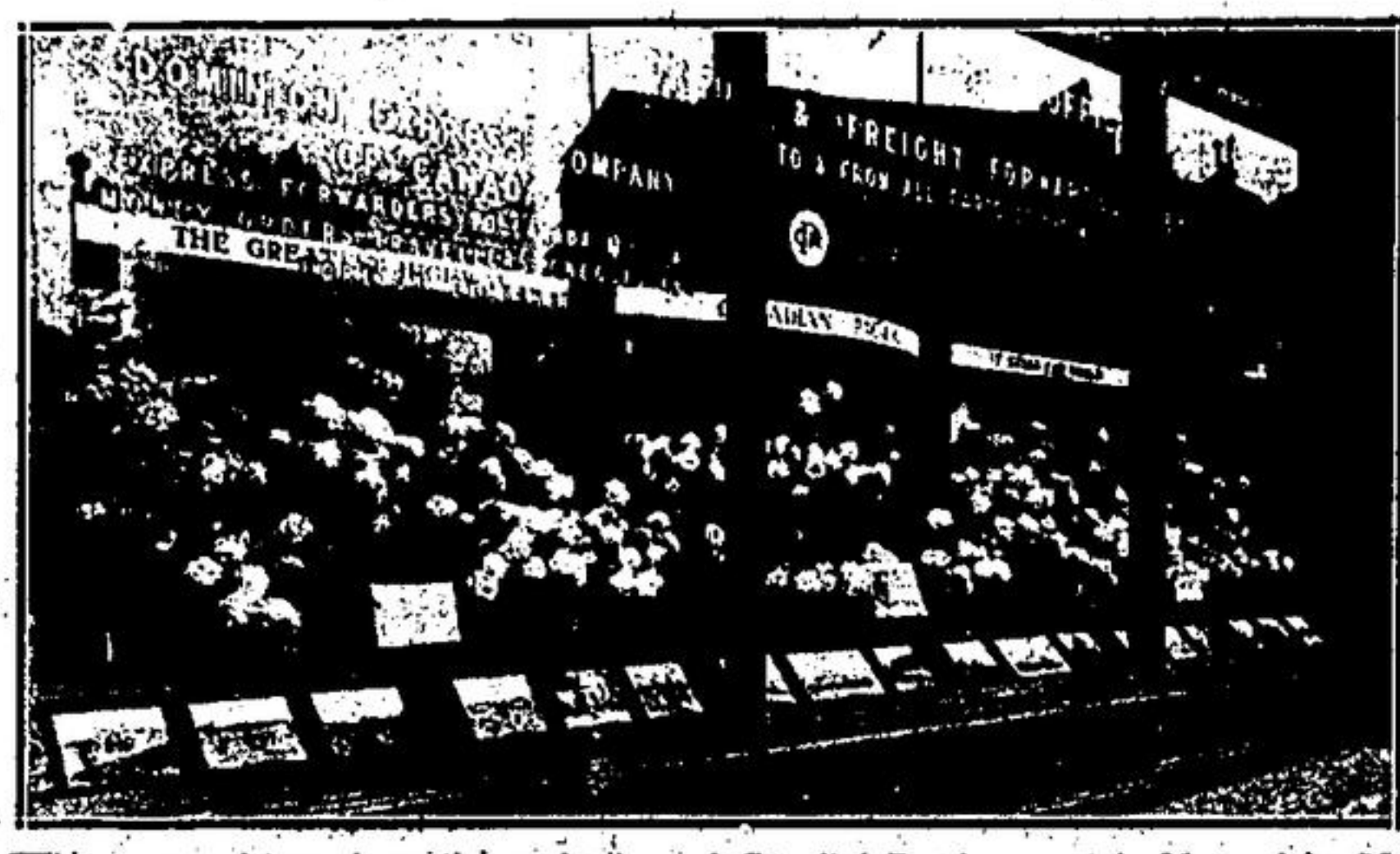

This unique picture shows the much discussed Canadian Peonies grown in Montreal by Mr. Ormiston Roy and shipped to England in cold storage in a Canadian Pacific vessel, on exhibition in the window of the Canadian Pacific offices in London, England. The Royal Horticultural Society has presented the Bankia Silver Medal to Mr. Roy and several London papers have remarked editorially upon the extraordinarily perfect condition of the blooms after their long sea voyage. An interesting feature of the picture is that in the window may be seen the reflection of the new Canadian Building which stands almost directly opposite the Canadian Pacific Offices and was recently opened by the King and Queen.
