OH! BE CAREFUL!

This is the season when wild mushrooms are being gathered in large numbers in the woods and open fields. But the only safe way to avoid poisoning through these is to avoid picking them up in the woods. The most poisonous varieties will peel. Another rule is boiling specimens in salt water. No amount of boiling or fresh or salt water will remove poison from the deadly varieties that are to be found in considerable numbers.

One of the best rules is to learn to identify one or two edible varieties and stick to them. A mushroom, no matter what variety, which has the least speck of decay on it is absolutely unfit for use.

The good Department of Agriculture issues a good pamphlet on this subject. It can be had on application to the department at Toronto.

OBITUARY

Mrs. George A. Mitchell
The death of Mrs. George A. Mitchell, widow of the late George A. Mitchell, formerly of Georgetown, took place in Lacombe, Alberta, on Sept. 14, Mrs. Mitchell, who was in her eighty-second year, for the past few years had been living in Los Angeles, and was visiting her daughter, Mrs. F. H. Reed, at the time of her death, from pneumonia. The funeral took place from the residence of her son, Brigadier-General Charles H. Mitchell, 35 North Sherbourne, on Monday afternoon. Mrs. Mitchell was born in Toronto in 1843, and was the daughter of James Beckett and Ann Leckie. James Beckett was born in Paisley, Scotland, and after coming to Toronto married the daughter of Major Leckie, of the 57th Royal Artillery, then stationed in Toronto. Mrs. Mitchell was one of a family of four children when her parents died, and went to live with her aunt, the late Mrs. Franklin Jackson, of Westfield, Eglinton, near North Toronto. Her three brothers went to live in Kingston, and later to the United States. They subsequently all fought in the Civil War with the Northern forces. Mrs. Mitchell was married to Rev. G. A. Mitchell, of the Methodist Church, in 1869, and as a bride lived in Petrolia and subsequently in many Ontario towns and cities until her husband was succeeded in 1905, after which she resided in Toronto on Alexander St. and at 55 Birchmount Rd. She and her husband celebrated their golden wedding in August, 1919, on the same date as the return of General Mitchell from the war. Mrs. Mitchell was a member of the Metropolitan Church and was prominently identified with many church and charitable organizations in Toronto. Her husband died in October, 1922. She is survived by three children: Brigadier-General C. H. Mitchell, of the University of Toronto; P. H. Mitchell, consulting engineer, of Toronto; and F. H. Reed, of Lacombe, Alberta.

James Lind
James Lind, a well-known and highly respected resident of Nassagawaga Township, west of Milton, passed away Sept. 17th at the residence of his son-in-law, Elwood Wilson. He had been in failing health for some time, and his death was not unexpected. He leaves to mourn his loss, two daughters, Mrs. William Diamond, of Guelph, and Mrs. Elwood Wilson, of Nassagawaga, with whom he made his home since he sold his farm near Knatchbull.

Church Plans Own Insurance
Insurance of Anglican Church property was discussed by the executive committee of the Church of the Holy Trinity, of England in Canada, who met under the presidency of Archbishop Gossett, of Rupert's Land, Primate of Canada, at Ottawa last week. It was claimed that the rates for church insurance were out of proportion to the risks, and that the insurance companies were making money on church risks. There is a movement on foot to organize and manage their own insurance for church property.

RIGHT OF WAY THROUGH TRAFFIC

With Hamilton and Windsor already operating the "stop" traffic system on its main thoroughfares, and a new application now to hand from the City of Guelph for similar authority, the Ontario Department of Highways intends moving practically at once for the institution of this kind of loyalty which would be both practical and effective.
