Harvest Festival

At St. George's Church Largely Attended on Sunday—Splendid Sermon by Ven. Archdeacon Ingles, M.A.

There were large gatherings at both the morning and evening services at St. George's church last Sunday on the occasion of the annual harvest festival.

The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion with flowers, fruit, grain, vegetables, etc., and the services of thankfulness for a bountiful harvest and spiritual advancement during the past year were very impressive throughout.

The preacher of the day was the Ven. Archdeacon Ingles, M.A., of Toronto, who had assisted in the services by the Rector, Rev. Percival Mayes, and Lay Reader, Mr. Joseph Beaumont.

At the evening service the speaker chose his text from the 9th verse of the 9th chapter of St. Matthew, viz.—"Follow Me," and said in part:

"The harvest time is a call to all of us to give ourselves more fully to God than ever before, in increase in loyalty to Him and show our gratitude not only with our lips but in our lives. Jesus called men to follow Him and begin the work of the church and He is still calling men to-day. We are called to be true followers of Jesus Christ. How can we become better followers of Him? By perfect obedience to our Father and do His will. The Son of Man came not to be ministered unto but to minister to others. Jesus taught humbly service. There is no such thing as menial labor; there may be menial labor, but not labor. Who are called? All who are called by God and what constitutes the call. The greatest service in the world is that of a Christian minister. Jesus called to do a service when He said follow Me. Beware of covetousness for man's life consists not in his material possessions. Imitate Him who said, follow Me. Obey, serve and witness in our daily lives that we have been with Jesus. Follow me, said Jesus. He had temptation but commanded with His father through prayer and received power to overcome temptation. Thank God for the many blessings He has bestowed upon you and pray God for power and guidance to live the life that will enable you to follow Him."

The music by the choir during the day was exceptionally well rendered and added much to the impressiveness of the services.

SCHOOL ATHLETICS The Ontario provincial, separate high and preparatory school track and field championship will be held at Varsity stadium, Toronto on Wednesday, September 30, under the auspices of the Ontario athletic commission. This is the first attempt to hold an Ontario championship meet for school boys and is the greatest undertaking of the kind ever attempted in Canada. The province has been divided into nine districts. All expense of sending the winners to Toronto will be borne by the Ontario Athletic Commission.
