**Attend the Record Fall Fair at Georgetown on Saturday**

The seventy-ninth annual fall fair of Esquevitz Agricultural Society held at Georgetown on Saturday last was, as predicted, a record breaker. Over four thousand people were present. The showing of horses, cattle, sheep, pigs and fowl was splendid, while that of dairy, grain, roots, fruit, garden products, ladies' fancy work, fine arts and baking displayed in the large hall was displayed of former years in quantity and especially in quality. "The best year" was the general remark heard as one passed around the exhibits. The music was supplied during the afternoon by the 48th Highlanders Kilted Band of Toronto and Georgetown Citizens Band. An innovation during the afternoon was the presentation by the Georgetown Fire Brigade of a handsome Union Jack to the town Mayor Dale received the gift and thanked the donors, after which the splendid flag, which was certainly much needed by the town, was placed on the temporary flagpole in front of the grand stand by Chief Post and Deputy Chief Dunlop while the band played "O Canada."

**Norval School Fair**  
**A Splendid Success—Large Exhibit and Good Attendance**

Something new in School Fairs was inaugurated at Norval last Friday when the Public School held its first independent fair. The idea of the school fair is an excellent one but it is well known that in many places the children have really very little to do with the exhibits. Mother helps bake the cakes and bread, big sister does the sewing and father assists in preparing the vegetables and animal training exhibit. Almost all the children do is to carry home the prize money. The few children whose parents see that they do the work themselves have no chance in such a competition. It was different at Norval fair this year. The committee in charge of the Norval Fair were at the school early in the morning and the girls were there to do their baking. Oil stoves were provided and no one was allowed to assist in the slightest degree. The sewing and animal training were next done under supervision, and the flower exhibit prepared by the children themselves from flowers grown at home. The art work, writing, maps, etc., had been previously done under the supervision of the teachers. The vegetables were all grown at home.

When the exhibit was ready at 10:30 a.m. there was a fine display in all lines. Mrs. Kennedy of Georgetown and Mrs. A. McClure of Norval made excellent judges. Lunch was served at noon with the help of the Women's Institute who also ran the booth. In the afternoon there was an apple naming contest and a word naming contest, also public speaking, singing and sports. In the latter the little Armenian neighbors from the Georgetown Home joined. The committee in charge were the trustees, Messrs. R. S. Murray, Geo. Brown and C. Copeland, and Messrs. Alex. Noble, E. B. Snow and R. H. Hunter. The teachers, Misses Maxwell and Malcolm, rendered invaluable assistance. Norval is an up-to-date rural school having electric light, well equipped kitchen, piano and large athletic field. The fair was a great success and we hope it will be a permanent institution.
