Malcolm Young, aged 66 years, Sheriff at Lethbridge, Alta., died last Friday night. He was born at Georgetown, Ontario, and went West in 1882 and served in the Riel rebellion. In the early days he was a stage driver between Calgary and Edmonton. Deceased was a son of the late Thomas Young who conducted a hardware business in Georgetown in the early days.

Deceased was a son of the late Joseph Rudy, for many years a builder and contractor in Georgetown, and a brother of Mrs. Alfred Watson. Anniversary Services

In Knox Church Attended by Large Congregations—Splen did Sermons by Rev. B. L. Ellison

Another mole stone has been placed in the history of Knox Presbyterian Church, Georgetown, and the event was fittingly celebrated by the anniversary services held on Sunday last.

The church and pulpit of this beautiful church were fittingly decorated with flowers for the occasion. The services were an inspiration to the large congregation present, the preaching of the day being Rev. Dr. Ellison of Trinity Lodge church.
