No Declaration

Arrested Toronto Boys

It is with sincere regret that this announcement is made. "Dobbie" as he is known to one and all, is a young man with plenty of "go" in him and is a first class all round newspaperman. The experience he has gained in Petrolia will be put to good advantage in Starling, and while Petrolia will be the poorer because of his removal, the town of Starling will be enriched to the same extent.
 Since coming to Petrolia he has identified himself with the affairs of the town having held the office of treasurer of the curling club, secretary of the rugby club, director of the Chamber of Commerce and had the honor of being elected to the presidency of the District Press Association for the current year. Two Italians Killed
 A fatal accident occurred on the C. P. R. tracks, three miles west of Milton, Saturday evening, in which two Italians lost their lives. Pasquale Gardina, aged 29 years, who has a wife and family, and his brother, Guido Gardina, aged 26 years, were the victims. They were returning from visiting a brother at Guelph, and after leaving the train, started to walk east on the railway track to their home. They were apparently walking on the west-bound track, but had not gone far before they met a west-bound freight, and in getting out of its way stepped directly in front of an eastbound freight. Both men were instantly killed. Pasquale Gardina was carrying his 3 year old son in his arms, and seeing the engine almost upon him, and no chance of escaping death, threw his little son down the embankment, saving the child's life. The child sustained slight injuries about the face and head. An inquest is being held.
