Queen Mother Dead
Empire Plunged into Mourning
By Death of Beloved
Sovereign

Memorial Service in St. George's
Church on Friday Evening

Queen Alexandra, widow of King
Edward VII., died at 5.30 o'clock
on Friday afternoon, Nov. 20th, at
Sandringham, her country home.
Her death has plunged into deep-
est and sincerest mourning the en-
tire great realm over whose in-
habitants she reigned as Queen
during a decade, in whose hearts
she has been endeared for more
than three score years with an affec-
tion such as has fallen to the lot
of few, if any, Queen in history.
Queen Alexandra, "the Sea-
king's daughter" is dead, after a
reign of more than sixty years in
the hearts of the British people.
In 1863 Princess Alexandra of Den-
mark became the "blessed bride of
a blissful heir," and her beauty,
her kindness and active charity,
her devotion to the country, her
adoption as Princess of Wales, as
Queen and as mother of a King,
have made her beloved by the peo-
ple by no means a stranger in this
locality.

A Memorial Service in memory
of the Queen Mother, Alexandra,
will be held on Friday evening at
St. George's Church at 7.30 p. m.
The Mayor and members of the
Town Council will attend and in-
vitations have been given to the
local Masonic Lodge, Local Council
of Women and other public
bodies, and the general public are
cordially invited.
